THE DEATH OF CAPT FRANCIS

Well Known Alaskan Pilot Passed Away at Seattle on Tuesday.

The death occurred at Seattle at noon on Tuesday of Capt. Edwin H. Francis, younger son of the late Hon. Allen Hrancis, for 26 years United States consul in Victoria. Capt. Francis came to Victoria with his parents in 1862, and for many years made his home here. The immediate cause of his death was Bright's disease, of which he became a victim about three months ago. His decline was rapid. Capt. Francis had been notified by his physicians some time ago that the disease would terminate fatally and his death, while froming as a shock to his sister and friends; was not unexpected. Capt. Francis had been unconscious during the greater part of the time during the past three days. Mrs. Byron Z Holmes, his sister, who is a resident of Portland, was a constant attendant at his bedside, and was present when the end came.

Probably no mariner on the Pacific coast was so widely known among men who navigate the northern ocean as Capt. Francis, says the Seattle P.-I. He was recognized as one of the very best informed navigators of the North Pacific, and in this connection his services to the government were considered little

cinc, and in this connection his services to the government were considered little less than indispensible. For more than 20 years he had been almost continuously engaged as a master or pilot of government vessels between this port and Southeastern Abaska. He possessed a remarkably retentive memory, and to

Southeastern Alaska. He possessed a remarkably retentive memory, and to this fact his knowledge of the dangerous waters and other bughears to shipping was largely attributed.

Capt. Francis was born in 1850 at Springfield, Til. His father, Allen Francis, was the first American consul at Victoria, B. C., having been appointed to that post by President Lincoln. This was in 1862. The elder Francis served the government in this capacity for 26 years. It is said that it was from the elder Trancis that Secretary Seward gained the information concerning the warled resources of Alaska which determined him to enter into negotiations with Russia Tor its purchase. Consul Francis, at the time the negotiations were pending, was interested in a sailing fleet of trading vessels plying between Victoria and Alaskan points.

In 1869 Capt. Edwin H. Francis was appointed a deputy in the office of the collector of customs at Sitka. When Secretary Seward went north to inspect the Alaskan coast, Francis met him in Sitka. It was arranged that the secretary should proceed up the Chilcat river accompanied by a party in Indian causes. Their destination was Kloquan, where the secretary met Chief Kloklux with the result that the latter entertained the party at a great feast in true-tribal fashion. During the ascent of the river the party was fired upon twice by the red-skins, but no one was wounded. Capt. Francis accompanied Secretary Seward during the whole of his trip.

A service of note which Capt. Francis performed for the government was the planting of nearly all the buoys in the lighthouse service in Southeastern

As illustrative of a trait of Capt. Francis' nature it is related that during his life time he never killed a bird or animal, though at times confronted by the urgent need of food. In fact he was a humanitarian in its practical sense. He was very popular among the Indians, having gained a large acquaintace among them while operating a trading vessel known as the Rose. During his career as a mariner Capt. Financis never met with a serious accident, and with none whatever as a result of unskilful uavigation.
