ARMISTICE WILL BE CONTINUED

Final Agreement for Peace in Mexico Must Wait on the Retirement of President Diaz

JUAREZ, Mexico, May 19.—Peace will not be declared as in effect in Mexico, nor will the general armistice be terminated, until Senor Francisco Leon De La Barra becomes provisional president in succession to President Diaz.

No peace agreement will be signed, but an interim between now and then, when Senor De La Barra becomes president, will be utilized in inducing the Mexican congress to enact laws covering most of the points which it previously believed should be contained in the peace agreement.

The naming of the new cabinet which is to surround provisional president De La Barra, was the chief work of the day among the rebel leaders. Senor Madero did it with the assistance of some of his advisers.

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VANCOUVER ASKS ROAD TO NORTH

Resolution Passed at Meeting of Business Men Relating to Necessity of Railway to Peace River

VANCOUVER, May 19.—"It is of paramount importance that steps be taken to improve upon the existing government the necessity of providing, or assisting to provide, a railway from the coast cities to northern British Columbia and the Peace River country, and that the secretary write to the board of trade asking the board to call at an early date a public meeting under the auspices of the board of trade and the Tourist Association to discuss the proposed railroad to the Peace River country."

MACHINISTS STRIKE

KANSAS CITY, May 19.—Two hundred and fifty union machinists, boiler-makers, blacksmiths and pipe-men employed by the Missouri Pacific Railway company in the East Bottoms shops in this city went on a strike this afternoon. The men allege that the company violated an agreement made in St. Louis December 21, with reference to the transferring of strike-breakers from one point to another. The immediate cause was the employment in the shops here of a man said to have been a strike-breaker in St. Louis last fall.
