CAMPBELLTON WATER PRESSURE

The editor of the Tribune always on the alert to publish anything detrimental to the best interests of Campbellton, more particularly in reference to the water system, is like the drowning man, grasping at straw. At the Council meeting Wednesday evening Chairman McDonald stated that the pressure on the mains as shown at Engineer Black's office, was 75 pounds. This statement the learned editor of the Tribune takes as a text for an article on the lack of pressure for fire purposes on the water mains, even after an expenditure he says, of \$35,000 (which is about \$5 to \$6,000 more than the cost to date). If the editor of the Tribune knew anything about water and water pressure as regards elevation, he would not have made such a rash statement, but like the fool, he rushes in where wise men fear to tread. In conversation with Engineer Black the Graphic was informed that while the pressure gauge at his office registers 75 pounds, his office is at least thirty-five feet above the main at Shivers' upper shingle mill. Thirty-five feet gives 15.17 pounds per square inch, which added to 75 pounds gives 90.17 pounds as the pressure at that point. When we consider that at one time the pressure had fallen off to nearly 40 pounds we think that our readers will admit that the expenditure was not made unwisely, and Campbellton now has a water service its citizens should be proud of.

Mrs. Hamilton, of Kirkcubright, Scotland, widow of the Rev. George Hamilton, minister of the parish from 1820 to 1886, has just entered her 107 year. She has been a widow for 74 years.

The strain was too great for the crowd at the King's funeral in London last Friday may be gained from the fact that on the following day no lead than two hundred and sixty-nine pick pockets were arraigned in the police courts, while it is estimated onlookers were robbed of valuables to the amount of over half a million dollars. There was also a flood of complaints of burglaries committed during the funeral hours. Thousands of accidents occurred, and the hospitals were taxed to their capacity in caring for the injured, over seven hundred cases remaining after three weeks. The number of cases of poisoning, including minor injuries had been disposed of. Fully a score were fatally hurt, several having sustained fractured skulls, and internal injuries in falling from trees, windows and stands.

A KOREAN CONFERENCE

As the study of the language is the work assigned missionaries, the first year on the field, it cannot tell you much about my having a part in real, practical work. It is one is a "Jack of all trades" and master of one, he can expect to do much after a couple of years, but as "Jack of all trades" he or she can certainly make themselves very useful during the first year or two, by virtue of their knowledge of various things; and less liable to be handicapped in after years.

Because of emergencies which constantly arise in a foreign land, one is apt to feel especially thankful if they have acquired a knowledge in the home land of every thing that Providence has allowed to come in their way; for one cannot be too well prepared to work in a hostile country. Aside from language study and on or two hours a day in the hospital operating room, during the conference which began March 16th and ended March 24th, the work assigned one of our number, including myself, was "reading along." Before the opening of this I will try to give some idea of how the whole affair was conducted. It was much on the same order of what we would call a conference at home, but the chief feature was Bible Study and all who enrolled themselves in the conference were Christians. Such meetings are held for a week at a time all over Korea, wherever there is a Mission Station, and it is at these which the Koreans, especially the Christians, look forward to with great expectations. Not only the people living in the cities attend, but they come from the surrounding countries far and near; some of them walking one hundred miles over mountains and hills, carrying a sack of rice on their heads for use on the way. The Conference held at this time was for women, the Conference for men having been held some time ago. Plans for the accommodation of the country folks are made about four weeks in advance. The pastors stationed in the cities notify the native pastors of the little country churches and they announce to the members of the church which they are supposed to attend. At that time a decision is made as to where they shall be placed, whether in the city or in the country. Those who are not baptized or among the baptized. These are then subdivided, each teacher having fifty or one hundred in a class, an outline of each subject taught being given to each member. During their stay in the city, they are housed in school houses near the church, and in other dwellings which are built of mud, with roofs thatched with straw. All Korean houses are built on a larger scale, an ordinary dwelling house being eight feet by eight and some even smaller.

On the appointed day all assembled in the city church, which is quite a large building, made of wood, poorly lighted with two small stoves, in addition daylight peeping in through large crevices on all sides. This building for which the Koreans donated money and which they think very beautiful indeed, is large enough to accommodate two thousand people seated closely on the floor, the men on one side, the women on the other. After devotional exercises each morning, two periods a day were set aside for teaching singing. Am glad to say I know enough of the language to be able to do this, so the station assigned such work to another girl and myself. Probably if some of you were asked the privilege to stand in a corner behind the scenes, you would have a concert all to yourselves, as it is no easy task teaching Koreans to sing. It was a pleasant surprise to find a "top-born" they might hear if they were listening; but I do not think they would make much of an effort to follow the tune, repeating the words happened to be in the key of D Flat. In the key of F or G after much of, for on the part of a leader, they are capable of getting the right notes, somehow they do not seem to have an ear for half tones, and will slide along regardless of such. A building where there are one thousand or more trying to sing in the native tongue, the din and noise seems strange indeed, for the Korean voice is very weird and while many of them do not have single voices, they all try to sing enthusiastically and make a tremendous noise.

After taking turns at the organ and leading with the voice and baton, we were certainly ready to stop when the time was up and breathe easily for a few minutes. But at the end of the week there seemed to be decided improvement and they had learned several new tunes fairly well. As the Koreans are very fond of instrumental music it was suggested that I should play the mandolin during the last day of meeting. While tuning the instrument, which required about five minutes, they crowded on the platform until there was no moving space and at the same time others ran out of the building to spread the news and in less than ten minutes the church was full. After they were persuaded to resume their seats on the floor, they all listened attentively and did not want to go when the meeting closed.

During the Conference a woman afflicted with all kinds of diseases, "dyspepsia" attended regularly. With both lower limbs eaten away by the disease, to the knees, and all the fingers gone, with the help of a stick she would trudge in daily and take a seat on the floor by the side of other who apparently seemed to be very much unconcerned and not the least bit afraid of contracting the disease.
