AN ENGLISH SCIENTIST MAKES SOME PREDICTIONS.

to Contain 800,000,000 Within 100 Years, With Still Room for More—Races that Increase Amid Poverty and Others that are More Fortunate.

From the London Spectator. Very few calculations of things to happen fifty years after ever prove accurate, some unexpected and dormant factor al. intervening to confound the wisdom of the wise. We are not, therefore, much frightened when a statist, even like Mr. R. Giffen, tells us in the near future America may be fully peopled, and that Europe, its emigration stopped, will be filled with sses of workmen, driven to dangerous content by insufficient food. Over-population is a possible evil, for it has occurred China; though, be it noted, without e result of producing social discord there is no certainty that the evil will arrive. We know, to begin with, little of the true law of the expansion of population. The old theory that population expanded with prosperity is totally opposed to the acts. Not to mention the phenomenal growth of the population of India, without istence—the Irish population multiplied in misery till subsistence failed; while the Jews, a splendidly healthy and fairly-fed people, have either not increased

fairly-fed people, have either not increased at all or with exceeding slowness. Had they multiplied after the final dispersion like Teutons, the world would now belong to the Jewish people. The two branches of the Teutons, again, ircrease with such startling rapidity that they promise to overwhelm all other white races, but that rapid increase is novel, and did not occur, for example, during the long period of comparative peace enjoyed in England under the house of Tudor. In 1982 there may, as Mr. Giffen intimates, be 800,000,000 people in North America; but also there may not be 200,000,000. The emigration from Europe may stop altogether or be diverted; the age of marriage may be thrown back by social causes, as has undoubtedly happened among certain classes of our own society, or the rate of increase may change, as has repeatedly occurred in different parts of the world, without the visible intervention of new causes of mortality. There is reason to believe, as Mr. Giffen will know much better than ourselves, that in Scandinavia, from 1700 to 1300, without any perceptible emigration, the increase of population stopped altogether.

For the present—that is, for the thirty years beyond which we hold it vain to calculate with any hope of certainty, the grand rush and sweep of the European peoples to the west, which the future historian will record as one of the distinctive marks of the Victorian era, need not cease for any want of room.
