Patrick Keating, the smallpox patient who was removed from Wellington street west end days ago, died in the hospital at 2 v'clock yesterday morning. On to within an hour of his death no fear were emertained that he would succumb, but he took a sudden turn for the worse and was dead in a few minutes. He was one of the patients who contracted the disease at the tailoring establishment at 112 King street west. This is the first death from smallpox alone since the disease broke out five months ago. For over a week no new case has occurred.
