A POLICEMAN'S TRAGIC END

MICHAEL LARKIN'S KILLING OF A BOY

How He Took His Life—In the Early Morning He Put a Bullet in His Head—The Police Officer Michael Larkin (No. 128), attached to Headquarters, committed suicide at 6.50 yesterday morning in George-street, near the Newby's Home, by shooting himself through the head with his own revolver.

There was one eye witness of the deed, a man named George McCracken, who was standing outside the gate of the home when Larkin pulled the trigger of his pistol.

Mr. Larkin was just breathing when McCracken rushed to his assistance. He died within three minutes. Word was at once telephoned to headquarters, and the patrol wagon was ordered to the scene to take the body to the morgue.
