

CLOSE CANADIAN FACTORIES.

The Probable Effect of Reciprocity in Agricultural Implements Between the Dominion and the U.S.A.

Flows and other agricultural implements which the House bill made free have a provision that all the articles mentioned when imported from any country which lays an import duty on the articles coming from the United States shall be subject to duties under existing law.

This clause in the Wilson bill published in yesterday's World was the topic of much discussion in the city yesterday.

Mr. James K. Kerr, vice-president of the Massey Manufacturing Company, speaking yesterday to the probable effect on Canadian manufacturers should reciprocity be established with the United States in agricultural implements.

The result would, in his opinion, be the closing up of Canadian manufacturers. We not only pay higher wages than they do across the line, but the cost of materials is higher here. As you are probable aware United States manufacturers have been lobbying Washington for some weeks, and succeeded in getting this clause inserted in the bill by representing that if Canadian agricultural implements were allowed to come in free while they themselves had to pay a duty to ship into Canada, the other hand would be that American manufacturers would capture our markets and the local manufacturers would have to close up. While the outside manufacturers could not bring in either better or cheaper machines, still they would flood Canada with their machines and so divide up the business that there would be no room for us.

It might be that we are not opposed to a fair reduction on agricultural implements provided that there is a similar reduction on the materials used in their construction.

A gentleman connected with the firm of John Abell stated last night that the effect of reciprocity in agricultural implements, as called for in the United States Senate tariff bill, would be to give the trade of the Northwest to the American manufacturers and implement builders. But he did not think the Canadian Government would be a party to it.

Free Library.

The Public Library Board met yesterday afternoon with these members present: Messrs. A. R. Bowell, T. Kelly, James Kerr, C. J. McCabe, Frank Somers, W. D. McPherson, John Taylor and Miles Vokes, chairman.

An application was received from Mr. W. B. Malcolm asking that he be given a lease of a vacant lot in Lombard-street owned by the board. Mr. Malcolm wants the lot by the month for a storage yard, and wished to lease it for five years and erect a foundry on it. The application was thrown out on a motion by Mr. Bowell.

The report of the Library Committee was presented asking that Miss Higgins, who are at present on the occasional list, be placed on the list of regular assistants. It also recommended that Mrs. Rose be placed in charge of the eastern branch of the library, starting from Feb. 5. After some discussion the report was adopted.

The report of the Building and Finance Committee was also received. The report recommended that for an interim appropriation of \$3000. Accounts were passed amounting to \$2900.

The Isolation Hospital.

Mr. J. B. Perry gives the public valuable advice in recommending the Isolation Hospital as superior to the private home in case of diphtheria or other infectious diseases occurring in the family. Not only does the patient receive better treatment there than in the home and consequently improve the chances of pulling through but isolation prevents the disease spreading to other members of the family. When an infectious disease manifests itself anywhere in the city, whether in the cottage or the mansion, the first thing to do is to isolate the patient and to have the patient isolated in the Isolation Hospital. Mr. Perry attributes a case of diphtheria that recently occurred in his family to the fact that the patient was isolated in the middle of the street. His little girl stood over one of these gratings to transfer with the result that she contracted diphtheria.
