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

About Wool

Long & Bisby, wholesale wool dealers, Hamilton, have sent out the following circular:

"All classes of wool now have free entry to the U. S. This will enable the unwashed wool to go there this season. We think it would be just as well for the farmers to shear their sheep without washing. The flocks are now so small and in many cases this washing was poorly done and caused trouble to both buyer and seller.

Formerly unwashed wool was bought all round and sold to the local manufacturer the same way. When shipping to the U. S. it will have to be graded same as the washed. That is cotted, black, burry and seedy fleeces culled and bought as rejections."

According to G. G. Bramhill of the local Department of Agriculture the past winter was not a severe one on the fruit trees in the county. On a recent trip to the northern part of the county Mr. Brambill examined a number of the peach orchards in the fruit belt and found that the trees were uninjured. He states that unless some unforseen calamity happens the fruit crop in Lambton county will this year be a bumper one.
