The report says that when this scheme was originated, there was only one missionary in the Presbytery of Halifax, and two-thirds of his salary was paid by the Colonial Committee; now there are three ordained ministers in charge of three congregations, and also two catechists employed in the summer months, and no supplement is drawn from Scotland. The Convener states that much inconvenience would be avoided if congregations would make their collections at least three months earlier than they have been doing—which, please note.

**BRETHREN,**—Another year has passed away, and it again becomes the duty of the Session to report upon the state of the Congregation. It is with devout thankfulness to God for His continued goodness that the following facts, which show very good progress during the year 1874, are submitted:

In addition to these, about twenty-five families connected with the Congregation reside in the country. It is much to be regretted that more attention cannot be paid to them. Services are held every fourth Sabbath at North River, but occasional week-night Service only can be given to Harmony and Greefield. The Session, however, think that the families residing in these Settlements could and should attend Public Worship more regularly in Truro, as many of them live within six or seven miles from the Church. The Session also think that owing to the increase of the Congregation, the Trustees should soon be able to announce that it is self-supporting.
