AN EVENTFUL CAREER.

IT is reported that two priests have visited the valley of the Mohawk for the purpose of discovering if possible some trace of the spot where the French Jesuit Isaac Jogues was murdered by the Indians, and that the intention was to have the place marked by an appropriate memorial stone. The most satisfactory conclusion reached by the explorers was stated to be that the scene of the tragedy is near the residence of Mr. Veeder, not far from the village of Fonda.

The story of this man's adventures among the Indians, as told by Parkman from records which are accessible only to the specialist in such fields of research, is one of the most interesting of the tales connected with the Jesuit missions among the northern tribes. Jogues—or Jagues, as some
