FURTHER INITIATIVES TO SUPPLEMENT DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITIES

Mr. John Lundrigan (Gander-Twillingate): I should like to ask the Prime Minister whether the government intends to announce any new initiatives at the federal level in order to supplement the activities of the Department of Regional Economic Expansion and whether he plans to make a statement on motions outlining such initiatives?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): As far as the activities of the department are concerned, the minister informs me that the agreement has not yet been signed, and it will have to be signed before the activities bear their fruit. On the general question of unemployment, I do not see that it would be very useful to make a statement on this subject during the next few weeks. I have already explained several times that unemployment would be substantially more serious in Canada if Canada were not waging such a fight against employment—

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Trudeau: —against inflation. But I have ceased to try to convince the opposition of this.

Mr. Lundrigan: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Would the right hon. gentleman consider relaxing government restrictions that have been placed on the spending of the Department of Public Works in view of the fact that not only is unemployment increasing but there is an increasing lack of activity in an area where a relaxation of restrictions is vital for the east coast fishing industry?

Mr. Speaker: Order. It seems to me that the question asked by the hon. member was asked last week in precisely the same terms on Thursday or Friday, I believe.

NEWFOUNDLAND AND NEW BRUNSWICK— SIGNING OF SPECIAL AREA AGREEMENTS WITH PROVINCES

Hon. Bryce Mackasey (Minister of Labour): Mr. Speaker, the suggestion is a very progressive one and certainly a very fitting way to celebrate Manitoba's entry into confederation. Moreover, I hope private industry will listen as carefully as I was.

Mr. Joseph-Philippe Guay (St. Boniface): A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. I was hoping that the question would apply to all civil servants, not only those in Manitoba. As 1970 is Manitoba's centennial year, this is the type of celebration that we would request the minister to consider.
