that is not quite as popular in Quebec, representing associations that are opposed to the Bill, but the vast majority of Quebecers object to the fact that the Senate is obstructing the Bill. That is the difference.

Mr. Rodriguez: Mr. Speaker, the Hon. Member for Montreal—Sainte-Marie (Mr. Malépart) said that the NDP does not understand Quebec, that the NDP does not understand that Quebec is a distinct society. Well, I want to point out that it was the three Liberal Members who had proposed that the words "Quebec as a distinct society" be deleted from the motion on the Meech Lake Accord, and ten others voted against the Meech Lake motion.

Some Hon. Members: Yes, against!

Mr. Neil Young (Beaches): Mr. Speaker, the revelation just disclosed by the Hon. Member for Nickel Belt (Mr. Rodriguez) is quite shocking indeed. However, it is not surprising because the same type of thing happened prior to June of last year and was well documented in the magazine *This Magazine*. There was a complete story in *This Magazine* about the history of Bill C-22 and the development of policy for it.

As I recall, that article outlined how the pharmaceutical industry, particularly the multinational organizations, had launched intensive lobbies over the years, primarily with Ministers in Liberal Governments.
