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program in this country. Yet there is no definition in the trade agreement of a subsidy, because the Government did not include one.

I would ask the Government, and particularly the Minister for International Trade (Mr. Crosbie), to press as hard as he possibly can for the abolition of this countervail against Sydney Steel Corporation, because under the global provisions of the Canada–U.S. trade agreement it should not be there anyway. And if not, then a corporation like Sysco that has taken advantage of Canadian programs, abided by Canadian laws, will be punished retroactively by the laws of the United States.

MEN'S WORLD FIGURE SKATING CHAMPIONSHIP WON BY KURT BROWNING OF CAROLINE, ALTA.

SUDBURY NEUTRINO OBSERVATORY PROJECT

Mrs. Diane Marleau (Sudbury): I rise today on behalf of my constituents and on behalf of all Canadians to inform this House of a very important scientific project, the Sudbury Neutrino Observatory.

This project affords Canada a unique opportunity to establish a major underground science laboratory of the highest international stature and to perform a truly fundamental experiment of world class.

A neutrino is a particle given off by the sun, and by studying its properties in a unique location deep within Creighton Mine, scientists will have a more complete understanding of the universe.

We are deeply concerned about delays in a funding decision. There are great economic as well as scientific benefits to be gained by this laboratory.

Substantial financial contributions are expected from outside Canada and further delays could jeopardize this support. I ask that a definite commitment be made now, by the federal Government.
