Senate Committee on Science Policy will meet on Thursday to consider the third report of that committee, and the Foreign Affairs Committee will be in a position to present its report on the Expanded European Communities some time next week.

It is also expected that the National Finance Committee will have ready for tabling in the Senate its supplemental report on the 1973-74 estimates respecting Information Canada. I should add that this work of the National Finance Committee has not yet been concluded and it is likely that that committee will be sitting next week as well.

The amendments made by the Banking, Trade and Commerce Committee to Bill S-4, to amend the National Parks Act, reported today, will have to be taken into consideration here next week. In addition, it is expected that we will receive from the other place the Parole Act amendments, the Crop Insurance Act amendments, and the Canada Pension Plan amendments, and possibly some other bills. Also next week the Honourable Senator Fergusson, our Speaker, will call the attention of the Senate to the visit of Canadian parliamentarians to Hungary from April 25 to 30, 1973.

I should also inform the house that at 5.45 this afternoon there will be royal assent, and it is expected that honourable senators will attend in great numbers as usual.

Hon. Mr. Flynn: If it is not asking too much! Motion agreed to.

TANZANIA, KENYA AND SOUTH AFRICA

VISIT OF CANADIAN BUSINESSMEN—DEBATE CONCLUDED

The Senate resumed from Tuesday, June 12, the debate on the inquiry of Senator Cameron calling the attention of the Senate to the recent visit of a group of Canadian businessmen to Tanzania, Kenya and South Africa.

Hon. Donald Cameron: Honourable senators will recall that when I opened this discussion on Tuesday, June 12, I reviewed briefly some of the highlights of the situation in Tanzania, and I wish to proceed now to complete this phase and move on to discuss the situation, as we found it, in Kenya and in South Africa.

One essential criterion for success in developing countries is the quality of its leadership. In this respect, Tanzania is fortunate in having as its leader and president, Dr. Nyerere, an outstanding statesman in Africa today and a man who ranks high among similar people throughout the world. Associated with him are a number of other very able men: the Honourable Joseph Mungai, Minister of Agriculture, who is a graduate of the Banff School of Advanced Management, and who is a lively and dynamic character with boundless energy and enthusiasm. Some of my colleagues, particularly Senator Martin, may remember the distinguished Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Malecela, who was the first Tanzanian High Commissioner to Canada. He had had a good deal of experience in Canada and the United States, where he was his country's representative at the United Nations for a number of years, and he is a man who can hold his own with anyone. There are quite a number of others who are equally competent and this is one of the special assets which this country possesses. Interestingly enough, there is a special relationship between President Nyerere and Prime Minister Trudeau. Both were teachers before going into politics,
