MONTREAL, May 9 .- "There is a healthy, hopeful tone thruout the west," said Sir Thomas · Shaughnessy, after his return from an extended trip over the lines of the Canadian Pacific as far as the coast. The president was in optimistic mood and expressed the opinion that the stringency and the
