WEST OF ENGLAND STILL UNBEATEN

Draw Saturday With Irish—
Welsh, Overseas and N. of
E. Winners.

Saturday proved to be one of the best since the formation of the new British Rugby League. All the four games were contested in a spirited manner, and the results proved that the players are now far more evenly matched than appeared from the first few weeks.

The Y.M.C.A. team were again unfortunate in not being able to gather a full team to start their game with the North of England, but seven men, they, however, stuck well to their guns and by hard work managed to keep the Englishmen from scoring for twenty minutes, when the North scored a try. After the half-time three more men joined the Y's and in this half again they managed to keep their opponents from crossing their line more than once, although the North of England team scored six points (2 goals) from penalty kicks. The result must be gratifying to the losers, and should encourage them for their cup game this week.

The Overseas managed to gain their first two points at the expense of the unfortunate South of England team. Both clubs played excellent football, and the South were handicapped by having a man short. With teams equal in numbers a great between these teams should result.

The Overseas are having a special practice at Riverdale Park tonight at 8.30. All players are requested to be present, in view of the cup game with the Irish team, which is to be played later in the week.

The Irish team played an excellent game against the leaders of the league, and, although they were out of luck, they kept their opponents from doing so, and shared the points. The quality of Rugby shown in this game was splendid, and it is to be hoped that many more games like this will be seen before the end of the season.

The Scottish and Welsh Clubs played a three-point draw at Moore Park after a game which was fast and played in excellent spirit. Both teams were at full strength and played a magnificent style. The hand-to-hand passing was splendid and the tackling was sure, neither side giving any chances.

C. P. R. PRESIDENT NOT A BIT BLUE

Insists Canada Has Come Thru the Crisis Wonderfully Well.

MONTREAL, May 9.—"There is a healthy, hopeful tone throughout the west," said Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, after his return from an extended trip over the lines of the Canadian Pacific as far as the coast. The president was in optimistic mood and expressed the opinion that the stringency and the consequent slackening would in the end prove beneficial. "Canada came thru the crisis wonderfully well," he said, "and, after all, we really have very little to complain of."

The indications are that the revival is on the way, and it may come sooner than people anticipate. Of course, business is quiet in the west, where they have a lot of disturbing influences that we are not troubled with. Discussing the line of the railway, Sir Thomas said, "It is now in the best shape it ever was."

Asked if the directors had in contemplation any program for development and further improvement, Sir Thomas answered, "No. You are engaged in an extensive plan of development and have spent hundreds of millions of dollars for the purpose. This year will be devoted to carrying out the program, and we have to look out; indeed, we will have to hurry to do it all this year. After that we can consider things. Really we have done so much and the road is in such fine condition that we can afford a little breathing spell."

JURY DISAGREES IN MURDER TRIAL

Joseph Larue Will Spend Summer in Jail Awaiting Fall Assizes.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., May 10.—Joseph Larue, charged with the murder of his wife on March 11, 1913, will now spend the summer months in jail awaiting the fall assizes. After deliberations for the defence for over 14 hours, the jury was unable to agree on a verdict. Justice Britton delivered his charge to the jury on Friday night, finishing at 8.30. It was 10.30 on Saturday morning when the jury gave up endeavoring to reach an agreement. The chief witnesses for the crown were a brother of the prisoner and the wife of the crown's witness, with whom the prisoner and his wife had boarded previous to her disappearance and subsequent finding in the river. H. D. Gamble, K.C., of Toronto, was the prosecutor, and Uriah McFadden defended the prisoner.

The case of A. A. Ross of Wawa, with criminal libel, was also given to the jury, and a verdict returned in half an hour of not guilty. G. H. Hayward defended the prisoner.
