The statement that Russia will assist in maintaining order in Outer-Mongolia probably means that she will increase the number of troops in that territory, which heretofore have a consular guards. It that territory, which heretolore have served merely as consular guards. It is believed that several railways will follow the Kiakhta-Urga line, and that much of the country will be developed.

tain control of its external affairs is tain control of its external affairs is meaningless, because practically there are no dealings with any country except Russia. The general opinion held here is that the Chinese Government really suffers nothing from the loss of Mongolia, altho Russia and the Mongolia will probably be greatly benefited. Russia's position in Mongolia is now stronger than in Manchuris.

Adopt Gold Standard,

NANKING, China, Jan. 8.—The republican assembly, which is now in session here, voted to-day the introduction of a gold standard modeled on that of Large and the control of that of Japan. It also approved a bond issue of 100,000,000 taels (approximately \$70,000,000) secured on the internal revenue for five years, with interest at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum.

Troops to the Front. SHANGHAI, Jan. 8.—A body of 4000 Cantonese troops has departed uy train for Nanking. Five transports are in dock awaiting the embarkation of troops and the loading of supplies and ammunition. It is presumably the intention of the republican cabinet to initiate a movement toward Chinwang.

Look for Pitched Battle. PEKIN, Jan. 8.—The armistice between the opposing imperialists and revolutionary forces has not been re-newed and negotiations between the leaders have reached a deadlock. The government expects and hopes that the

revolutionary troops will move north-ward from Nanking and give an op-portunity for a pitched battle on ground favorable to the imperialists. The lack of funds prevents the imper-lalists from despatching to the south a force sufficient in strength to assure the victory on which the imperialists count to give them the command of the situation.

Chinese Hold Gorgeous Parade and Wind Up Day With Speech

With the new flag of the recently with the new flag of the recently established republic of China flaunting bravely from half a hundred carriages, and with the national emblems of Canada, Great Britain and the United States, intermingling with the new insignia of Chinese liberty, 1000 queueless sons of the Celestial Empire paraded the down town streets of Toronto yesterday afternoon, and with the beating of tom-toms and songs of Mongolia, proclaimed their joy in the acclamation of Dr. Sun Yat Sen as provisional president of "New China."

And had Dr. Sun Yat Sen been able to leave his acclamation ceremonies in

"Good boys," "Fine," and "Great work," sang out the crowd as the procession moved along, a panorama of bright banners, emblazoned with legenis in the language of Confucius. Chinamen garbed in the colors of the rainbow, others in carriages, but with the great bulk of them on foot, dressed in the staid fashion of western civilization.

And there were, in the carriages, the Chinese women and the babies, all togged out in furs, frills and veilings that any woman might envy.

The procession left Victoria Hall at 2.30 p.m., going up Church to Cariton, to College, to Spadina, to Queen, to York to Wellington, to Church, and back to the hall.
