Inquiring Into Fatal Collision. Alex. Calvey, London, Ont., and unidentified Sailor Victims of Accident in Lake St. Clair.

DETROIT, Oct. 21.-(Can. Press).-In an effort to determine the cause and if possible fix the blame for the collision today between the steamers Pine Lake and Fleetwood, which resulted in the sinking of the former and the drowning of two members of her crew, an investigation by federal inspectors has been started.

The accident occurred in Lake St. Clair, off Peche Island. According to Captain Ferguson of the Pine Lake, "crossed signals" were responsible. Captain Kinney of the Fleetwood appeared before the inspectors a few hours after the accident.

The Pine Lake, a small boat, sank in less than a minute after she was struck. The victims were Alex. Calvey of London, Ont., a wheelman, and an unidentified sailor.

The Nursery Baby's Feet.

When baby is small, keep his feet warm. Soft loose stockings that come up over the knees and better than booties, especially when the baby wears short clothes for birth.

When baby becomes more active and kicks his feet up, he should wear thin booties over the stockings in winter, but not, of course, in warm weather.

Soft little kid shoes may be worn instead of booties. When the young man starts to creep he should wear soft-soled boots. From now on he will try to stand alone, and his ankles need support.

When the child is old enough to wear hard-soled boots, you cannot be too careful in your selection of good-fitting shoes. The baby foot is so pretty, so soft and pliant that a hard-fitting shoe can work harm in a very short time.

Let the walking child wear high shoes, or boots, as we generally call them, rather than slippers. The slippers with the extension sole soon "turn over" and, besides spoiling the foot, they are very uncomfortable for the child.

Do not let the child wear heavy shoes to maintain yesterday's record. The fact that the Creche since its establishment in 1909 has taken care of 25,000 poor children is a potent argument in securing contributions.

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GETS \$300,000 OF BIG ESTATE

Mrs. Emily V. Campbell was Successful in Her Suit to Upset Her Father's Will.

Mrs. Emily V. Campbell, who filed a caveat in an effort to have the will of her father, Charles Bugge, declared invalid, has won her case.

Charles Bugge left an estate of \$472,000. One daughter survived him—Mrs. Campbell. In his will he left her nothing, the testator stating that she had provided for her during his lifetime.

The estate was divided between Mary Cooper Jarrett, Isabella M. Boys, and Elizabeth Forster. Mrs. Campbell testified that her father was of unsound mind when the will was signed by him.
