Regulation of Express Charges by the Railway Commission.

For three or more successive sessions W. F. Maclean has tried in the house of commons to have a law passed regulating the rates of the express companies of this country, and on every occasion the Laurier government have ordered their followers to vote it down. He showed that the railways really owned the express companies, that they were doing an ever increasing business in express parcels, that in Europe the government regulation had developed an enormous movement of farm truck to the cities by express at low rates, that the fruit and vegetable growers and the producers of milk, cream, butter and poultry for our Canadian cities were absolutely at the mercy of the express companies. But this had no effect on Sir Wilfrid Laurier or Hon Mr. Fitzpatrick, minister of justice, who discovered grave constitutional impediments in the way of such a law. So it was kicked out of parliament,
