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BIG NORTHWEST RECEIPTS

Help to Keep Prices of Wheat Futures Down.

Chicago Options Declined Half a Cent, and Liverpool Quotations Declined Even More—Corn Lower—World's Visible Supply—Local Grain, Fruit and Live Stock—Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, July 18.

Liverpool wheat futures today declined, and closed 1d to 1 1/2d per cwt lower than yesterday.

Chicago's wheat market was dull again today, futures declining about 3/4c a bushel.

The clear weather factor was found in the large Northwest receipts. Prices here largely recovered.

Liverpool maize futures fell 3/4d to 1/2d per bushel today.

Chicago corn declined a day.

Peas declined 3/4d in London per cwt.

Wheat shipments to the United Kingdom, 10,000 quarters; to Continent, 1,000 quarters.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days, 200,000 cwt., including 57,000 cwt. of American. Corn same time 143,000 cwt.

Exports at New York today: Flour 35,000 cwt., and no barrels; wheat, 258,438 bushels.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth today 802 cars, against 58 cars the corresponding day of last year.

Bradstreet's says there was a decrease in the week of 1,000,000 bushels in the world's visible wheat supply.

Supply decreased 680,000 cwt. to 58,000,000 bushels. During the past week the world's visible corn supply decreased 1,400,000 bushels, and oats 534,000 bushels.

Receipts of live stock were large today.

Quality of fat cattle generally fair, with a few choice, well-branded lots.

Trade fair, export cattle easiest, the bulk selling from \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt.

Good butchers' cattle scarce, and prices firm, at Friday's quotations, while interior grades are slow sale.

Export cattle—Choice heavy exporters sold at \$4.50 to \$5.25 per cwt., and \$3 to \$4.50 for lower grades.

Export Bulls—For export are scarce with prices firm, at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Weights, ranging from 1100 to 1150 lbs. Lots of good butchers' cattle sold at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Common butchers' cattle sold at \$3.50 and inferior at \$3.12 1/2 to \$3.35 per cwt.

Very inferior rough cows and bulls at \$2.80 to \$3 per cwt.

Lots of good butchers and exporters, mixed, sold at \$4.25 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Heifers, with prices easier, selling at \$3.20 to \$3.50, and \$3.25 to \$3.50 for steers.

Feeder—Very choice, selected choice well-bred steers, weighing from 900 to 1000 lbs. would be worth about \$3.70 to \$3.90 per cwt.

There were about 20 cows of medium to good quality, which sold at \$2.5 to \$3 each.

Prices for calves were firm at \$1.50 to \$2 each, with deliveries of about 25.

Sheep—Sheep and lambs were plentiful, and prices easier, with a few choice, and bucks \$2.75 to \$3 per cwt.

On \$4.75 to \$5.10 per cwt, at \$5.10 to \$5.40 for the letter price only being paid for picked lots.

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WHEAT CROPS OF THE WORLD

Russia is Going to Have a Tremendous Shortage Compared With Last Year.

STORM DAMAGED BRITISH CROP

Prospects in India Greatly Improved in Some Parts, but Not in the Punjab.

Washington, July 18.—The Agricultural Department's foreign crop report for July states that the commercial authorities estimate the shortage in the Russian wheat crop at \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 bushels, as compared with last year. The deficiency is most serious in the regions most seriously situated, and the northwest is good in all but one province, that of Bukovina, Austria, Romania and Bulgaria, which is slightly below their average in wheat, rye and maize.

A fresh estimate of the Spanish and Italian crops puts it at 34,000,000 bushels below last year, the shortage being somewhat the heavier in Spain.

The wheat crop in France is represented as satisfactory, but the optimistic estimate made earlier in the season have been revised by later crop reports, the estimate now being 32,000,000 bushels.

Virtual certainty, cable reports of a severe general storm pressing considerable damage to a grain crop that otherwise would have ranked as "fair."

The report from India shows better conditions in Bengal and the northwest provinces than for several years previous, but the improvement does not extend to the Punjab.

VALENTINE GETS FEARS.

Not a Very Heavy Sentence for a Man Who Made Away With Over \$200,000.

New York, July 18.—George M. Valentine, cashier of the suspended Middlesex County Bank at Troy, N.Y., was sentenced today to six years in the New Jersey State Penitentiary at Trenton. He had pleaded guilty to the charge of larceny in connection with the appropriation of about \$200,000 from the Middlesex County Bank. The full amount of the defalcation has not been ascertained, but it is understood that it exceeds \$200,000.
