All negotiations are off, and every indication favors a strike. The trouble can scarcely be delayed later than Saturday. Both sides are preparing actively for the inevitable. There are no further dates for conferences. Everything has been broken off, the company offering a maximum of 21 cents an hour, and the men demanding 25 cents. The company's ultimatum has been received by the men and their only reply has been to rush their pickets out and get ready for a tie-up.

Early this morning there were various rumors that the street car employes would attempt to tie up the lines to-day. That gentleman, at two o'clock this morning, declared emphatically that no strike would occur to-day in any event and that all the men, as far as he had any information, would continue to take their cars out to-day and to-night. admitted, however, that it would be possible to call a strike on an hour's notice without a mass meeting, but he anticipated nothing

One man was heard to remark, however, on leaving the quarters: "We ought not to take our cars in to-night." If any such snap judgment is attempted by the men they will not find the company unprepared.
