Another Hundred Armenians Said to Have Been Killed.

THE RAIN IN INDIA CEASED.

London, Dec. 4.—It is announced that the rain has ceased throughout the country.

PLAGUE IN INDIA SPREADING. Bombay, Dec. 4.—The plague is spreading, and several Europeans have been attacked. Two of them died yesterday.

A NEW MASSACRE. London, Dec. 4.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Constantinople says that a new massacre has occurred at Ezerik, in which a hundred Armenians are reported to have been killed.

PRESIDENT OF LIBERIA DEAD. London, Dec. 4.—Advices received here today from Liberia announce that the President of the Republic, Joseph James Chesnut, died on Nov. 1. Vice-President Coleman was inaugurated President on Nov. 2.

THE QUEEN MAY VISIT IRELAND. London, Dec. 4.—According to a Dublin correspondent of the Daily News, there is talk of Queen Victoria visiting Ireland in 1897 in connection with the celebration over her reign having reached the longest period of any English monarch.

TO EXCLUDE AMERICAN PORK. Lyons, France, Dec. 4.—At a mass meeting held here of the organized farmers' unions, the dealers in salt meats adopted a resolution in favor of the exclusion of American pork products in view of the fall in the price of swine.

A NAPOLEON MANIFESTO. Paris, Dec. 4.—The police have seized at the Gare du Nord large packages of manifestos bearing the name of Napoleon bearing the historical date of Dec. 2 and informing his adherents that the time is approaching when France will have to decide between a monarchy pure and simple and that democratic appeal to the people which gave eighteen years of national prosperity.

THE DOCKERS' TROUBLE. Hamburg, Dec. 4.—Various meetings of the strikers were held to consider the situation in view of the refusal of the employers to submit the dispute to a court of arbitration, and it was resolved to call upon the strikers' committee to declare a general strike.

AN AGREEMENT CONCLUDED with the warehouse company and a committee of the strikers for the settlement of the dispute, and the strike is over.

THE LONDON CHRONICLE'S correspondent at Hamburg telegraphs that all the harbor laborers employed by the state and city will join the strike.

IN EGYPT. Cairo, Dec. 4.—Lord Cromer, the British agent here, informs the Egyptian Government that in the event of the Egyptian debt being repaid, the case of the Egyptian debt of \$2,500,000 advanced to meet the expenses of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition to Dongola—Great Britain is prepared to advance such sum of money as the Egyptian treasury is unable to provide for that purpose.
