Said to Have Shot Himself.

Peace for Russia Does Not Mean a Free Press.

Abbe Percsi Was No Hobson-"Guinea Pig" Amendment to the Address Voted Down by British Commons-Crisis in Hungary.

A special cable to the New York Journal says: It is now definitely known that Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg, grandson of Queen Victoria, and son of the Duke of Edinburgh, committed suicide at Meran, Austria, whither he the prince's removal from Berlin was a gambling scandal compromising him gravely. He shot himself in the head, the wound proving fatal after several WEDDING PORTIONS FOR POOR days. It was given out by his family that the prince was suffering from

brain trouble. The gambling scandal which so affected the family honor that Prince Alfred's relatives found it desirable to declare him insane and place him beyoud the reach of pursuit or inquiry was the climax of a long series of scandals which had caused Berlin to consider him, at the age of 24, an irreclaimable spendthrift and roue. JOHN ORTH HEARD FROM. London, Feb. 16 .- The Paris correspondent of the Times says: According to a letter just received here from Argentina, the Austrian Archduke Jehn, alias John Orth, is now residing on the River Parana, and is more than ever resolved to renounce the prerogatives of his birth. The Austrian Archduke John Nopomunk Salvator, the youngest son of the Grand Duke Leopold II. of Tuscany, in 1889, renouncing his rank and all his Austrian military titles, owing to an irreconcilable quarrel with the aged Field Marshal Archduke Albert, against whom the impetuous young prince was allowed to commit the grossest possible breach discipline. Assuming the name Johann Orth and fitting out a sailing vessel, he disappeared with his morganatic wife, who, before her marriage, was the well known opera singer Fraulein Mizzi Stubel, and was not heard of again until it was reported that his ship, the St. Margaret, had been lost off the coast of South America in October, 1890. The next rumor as to his whereabouts was that he and most of his crew, having escaped from the wreck, had landed near the mouth of
