MAKES FAIR PAVEMENT

That Is Best Cleveland Will Say of Rock Ashpalt.

Ex-Ald. Stevely has returned from a visit to Cleveland. He brought back some valuable figures for the mayor, aldermen and City Engineer Graydon in regard to rock asphalt. Cleveland has found that rock asphalt is no good for repairing Trinidad

asphalt pavements. It will not wear. As to its use on a macadam roadway, Mr. Stevely says the best Cleveland 124% will say is that it makes a fair pavement.

Cleveland has its own asphalt repairing plant and repairs its pavements at a cost of only \$1 10 a yard, against \$1 75 charged by the contractors. Asphalt pavement is also being laid

on streets at a cost of \$1 35. One great benefit Cleveland finds in having its own plant is that it is possible to repair a hole the moment it is located, without having to wait until there is enough work to warrant a contractor taking hold of the job. Thus the streets are always in first-

class repair. The cost of the plant is only \$400. It has a capacity of 60 yards a day.


