WAR VETERANS' ASSN IS GROWING RAPIDLY

At Last Night's Meeting 136 New Members Attended.

One hundred and thirty-six members at a meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association bore testinony to the rapid growth of this organization within the past few months With branches in every important city, the association in which the London

With branches in every important city, the association in which the London branch at one time boasted but sixteen members, is becoming one of the largest organizations in the country. That it will become the most powerful and that its influence will not be confined to Canada, but will spread to the whole Empire and the United States was the prophecy made by Sergt.-Major Rawlings as he outlined part of the new constitution.

Since changes made at the Ottawa conference, he stated, the association is open to any man who has served with the Canadian forces in foreign fields, and embraces as well as associate members, men who received honorable discharges before going overseas, men who were rejected as medically unfit, and veterans of previous wars. Nurses serving with military units are also included in the membership. Associate members for the duration of the local organization was a motion appointing a band committee, with an idea of forming a band in connection with the association. At least sixteen members of the organization are known to be musicians, and others, it is felt, will offer their services when needed. A grant of \$100 from the funds of the association was approved, and at the next regular meeting a collection will be taken, which will be added to the band fund. In addition it is likely that the proceeds from the first patriotic indoor band concert to be held soon by the G. W. V. A. will be used for this purpose. That the men will support the proposition generally was evidenced by the offers of several \$5 donations.


