

M'GREGOR THE GREAT WINS EMPIRE STAKES IN STRAIGHT HEATS

Walter Cox Drives Great Trotter To New Record in First Heat.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 9.—Walter Cox, king of New England horsemen, achieved the ambition of his career at the Syracuse grand circuit meeting today when he piloted McGregor the Great, fleet son of Peter the Great and Ruth McGregor, to a straight heat victory in the classic Empire stake, \$10,000, for 2:12 class trotters. Cox not only won the event, but established a new record in the first heat which McGregor stepped in 2:03 1/4. It was the fastest time a trotter ever made in the big event. 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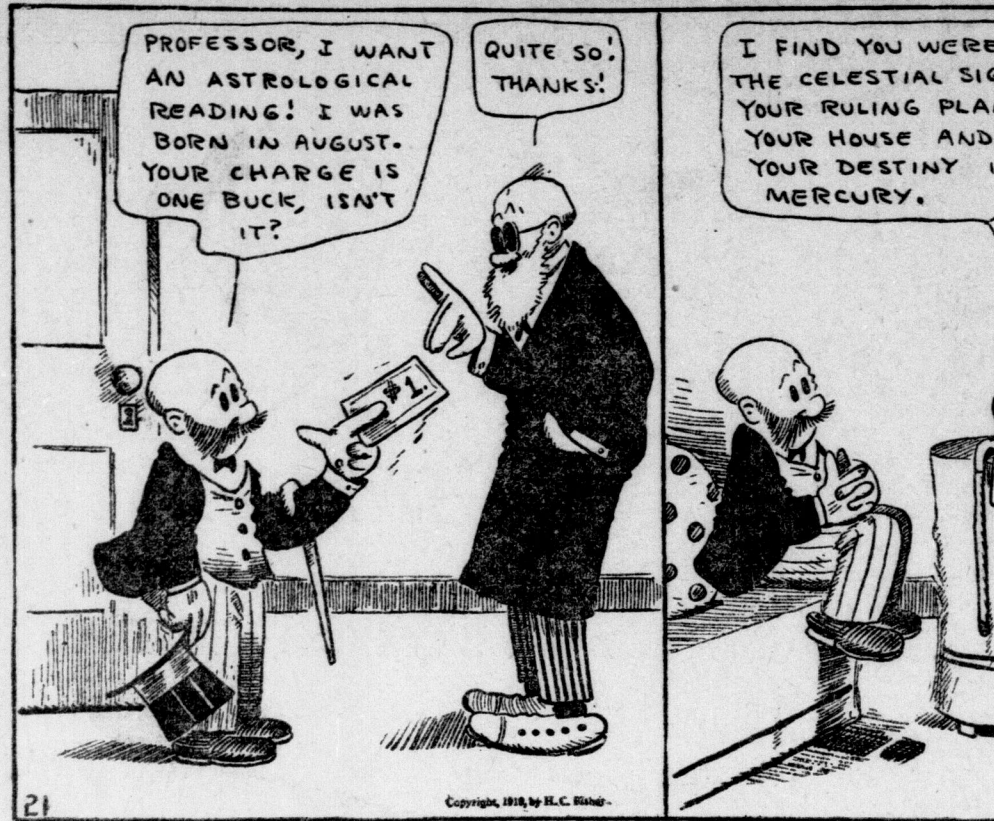

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Indians Wasted No Time in Winning Second Straight

Only Took Seventy Minutes To Go Full Route at Tecumseh Park Yesterday--Donnelly's Homer Off Pieh Scored Ham's Runs.

In a swiftest at Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon London stayed on the big end of a 5 to 3 score against the Hamilton Tigers, and incidentally staged a time record game for this season in the Minto League here, the spasm concluding in one hour and ten minutes. In all, 21 hits were registered during the game, including home runs by Command and Donnelly, the latter placing one of Cy Pieh's shoots in the left field shrubbery for the longest hit at Tecumseh Park this season. Command's single knocked against the fence in centre.

Okrie Hits a Triple. In the third inning Okrie walloped one to left field for three bases, scoring later on Mitchell's single, while Fearnley hit for three bases in the fifth along the right field foul line. Shaughnessy, rearing the pill in time to nip him at the plate and rob him of five bucks which otherwise he might have earned.

Okrie Allowed One Hit. Frank Okrie started for London, but was removed at the end of the fourth. "Dad" Stewart intending to use him against Toronto on Thursday. Zinn was the only "Pia" to secure a hit from Okrie in the four innings, and it was a scratch affair. Cy Pieh then took up the hurling duties for the Tecumseh. Schettler pitched the entire game for Sharp's hired help, and although hit hard at times managed to remain on the mound throughout.

Loose Base Running. The London players seemed to be determined to do individual work on the bases, everyone trying to steal with the result that none achieved their purpose. Chloroform or a similar sleep-producing substance was apparently thick in the neighborhood of second base as Command, Newman and Witry were nailed fast-footed here by Schettler when taking too big a lead. Hamilton went scoreless until the ninth, when Donnelly with his circuit clout drove in three counts.

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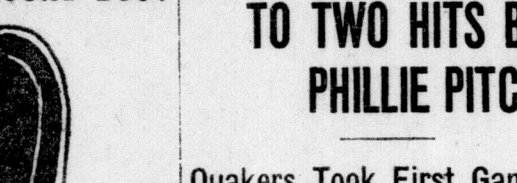
