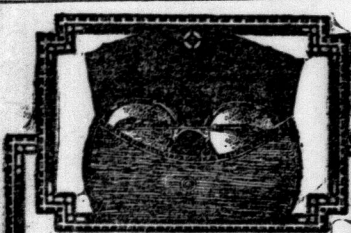

MURDER CHARGE FACING MARYBORO COUPLE ADJOURNED

Mrs. Beisel Allowed Renewal of Bail, But Col. Laughran Still Held.

GUELPH, Sept. 27.—The last sessions of the supreme court opened this afternoon at the court house with Mr. Justice O'Rourke presiding. After the grand jury had brought in a true bill on the murder charge against Col. Laughran and Mrs. Nellie Beisel, Maryboro Township, the case was adjourned to the 28th inst.

The first case to be proceeded with was a charge of seduction, entered by James O'Rourke, of the township of Maryboro, against Roy Livingstone, in the township of Arthur in which the plaintiff (O'Rourke) claims \$1,000 damages. The defendant abandoned any defence, while the plaintiff was represented by S. Clark of Mount Forest. The jury was only out about five minutes and returned with a unanimous verdict, recommending the payment of \$1,000 damages to the plaintiff.

URGING POLAND TO RE-ESTABLISH FRIENDLY DEALINGS WITH LITHUANIA

League of Nations Sending a Commission to Formulate a Solution.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—Leon Bourgeois, as president of the council of the League of Nations, sent a telegraphic message to Poland on Saturday urging Poland in her own interest to re-establish friendly relations with Lithuania and to accept the good offices of the league had sent an ultimatum to Lithuania.

M. Bourgeois said he was urging Lithuania to arrange immediately with the league for the evacuation of all Lithuanian territory, and asked Poland to give Lithuania time to do this. He also sent a telegram to both Poland and Lithuania that the council of the league was sending a commission to formulate a solution.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH VERDICT RETURNED BY CORONER'S JURY

INGERSOLL, Sept. 27.—That Tilford Ellis, Grand Trunk fireman, who died from injuries received at Patton's Siding, here, on Monday night, Thursday, was accidentally killed and that no blame was attached to anyone, was the verdict returned by the coroner's jury, before Dr. Williams. Three witnesses testified, Engineer Woodcock, Conductor Geo. Hand, and Dr. McDonald. The wash plug blew from the engine soon after the train on which Ellis was working, passed this town. This allowed the water and steam to escape, so that repairs were necessary to remove the coals from the firebox. Ellis was in the act of going to the engine when he was struck by a fractured skull. SINN FEIN PLOT FOUND IN LONDON; PRECAUTIONS TAKEN

Cabinet To Consider Question of Reprisals in Ireland.

BRITTON JAIL GUARDED

Sir Neville Macready Not Concerned With Police or Black and Tans.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The British Government has reliable information of the existence of a Sinn Fein plot in London, according to the Daily Mail. The newspaper says steps have been taken to checkmate any efforts to disturb the peace. Large forces of police are on duty every night in the neighborhood of Britton Prison, where Lord Mayor Terence MacSwiney of Cork, Ireland, is being held.

The cabinet will meet during the week and will consider among other things the question of Irish reprisals, the Daily Mail continues. Evidence in connection with this situation, collected by the Irish executives, will be submitted. A military inquiry into the Rabbittown affair already has been instituted, and it will be followed by a civil and judicial investigation.

He said he was very well connected with reference to the recent statement of Sir Neville Macready, chief of military command in Ireland, that he is not concerned either with the constabulary or the "Black and Tans."
