

START SHORTLY WRECKING BANKS FOR NEW HOTEL

Contractors Will Be in City
This Week To Make
Arrangements.

Contractors who have purchased the two bank buildings which now occupy the site of London's new hotel will be in the city this week to arrange for the wrecking of the structures. A considerable sum will be realized from the material secured.

The whole question of building costs and the trend of prices is being carefully watched at the present time by those associated with the new enterprise.

W. S. Sample, who has vast experience in the contract business, and is the Canadian manager for the George A. Fuller Construction Company of New York, the largest contracting firm in the States, stated that while people in London were anxious to go ahead with the construction of the hotel, he advised that the building be planned in detail before work started, as that was the most important feature in the construction of any building. His reason for so stating was that the property worked out and so ordered could be quickly put together, and that the material used was of minor consequence when the building was properly designed.

Mr. Sample stated that any delay caused by the planning of the building would be well spent, as he had decided to build the hotel at a price, and was also of the opinion that labor was giving greater returns to the contractor.

Mr. Sample looked for this change in prices and conditions to happen in the winter, and the middle of the winter, that while he was just as anxious to go forward with the construction as the management, he advised going forward with the construction as slowly, and said London would be amply repaid for any loss of time. He also stated he was assembling all the equipment necessary for the building of the hotel, and when the chief engineer takes full charge of the work, there would be no delay, and that the work would go forward quickly.

It was very gratifying to the second mortgage bondholders, as well as the promoters of the hotel, that this information, and everyone showed willingness to wait.

SECRET MEETING WAS HELD HERE

London Had Curious Connection
With American
Civil War.

A curious connection of London with the American civil war was set forth by Public Library on Tuesday evening. Within the last few days certain documents have become available dealing with the gigantic plot in the summer of 1864 to separate the northwestern group of states from the north and set up a separate confederacy. The leaders of the south were eager to see this carried out, knowing that it would weaken the north and strengthen their cause, and so from Canada, where they had residential agents, they formed connections with a large semi-political organization known as the Sons of the South, having about 300,000 members in the states north of the Ohio, where widespread disaffection with the administration at Washington prevailed.

On August 7-8 there was held in this city at the Tecumseh House, it is believed, a meeting between the Confederate commissioners and the agents of the Sons of the South, and at this meeting plans were laid for the formation of the new confederacy. The federal prisoners were to be attacked, and 30,000 Confederate prisoners held there were to be released, armed from state arsenals, and the whole government overturned in that part of the northwestern group of states. The Confederate agents in Canada, who made their headquarters in Toronto.

Mr. London traced the successive steps of the conspiracy from London on to Chicago, and the west, and showed the plot failed to realize the ends desired by its authors. The paper also dealt with several other interesting phases of the effect of the civil war upon Canada and Canadian questions, together with some information as to the economic aspects of the war in relation to employment and wages.

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FINE NEW CHURCH FOR EAST LONDON

Structure Will Cost \$30,000,
Modeled After Spurgeon
Temple.

After having served as a landmark as well as a place of worship for more than half a century, the First Christian Church building, at Dundas and Elizabeth streets, is to disappear, and a splendid new church will be built in its place. The property facing Elizabeth street on the rear of the present property. The property facing Dundas street will be sold for business purposes.

Plans for the new building and for securing additional property were presented at a banquet held Tuesday evening by the members of the church in celebration of paying off old debts under which the church has struggled for many years. Rev. J. H. Versey, who within one year of ministry has been instrumental in raising the \$1,750 necessary to redeem the present property, outlined the plans of the building committee.

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BURNING LEAVES INJURES PAVEMENTS

City Engineer Will Take Action
To Have Practice
Stopped.

Court action to stop the practice of burning leaves on the paved streets may be taken by the city engineering department if warnings do not prove sufficient to stop it. City Engineer Brazier pointed out that this means of getting rid of the autumn foliage is strictly contrary to city laws, and is very injurious to the pavements and also is a menace to traffic.

No less than twenty-eight bonfires were found to be burning on the new York street pavement, and in other sections of the city. According to Mr. Brazier, a hot fire of this kind will practically destroy the surface of a pavement, and will cause large holes to develop in it. The effect on the cement curbs and gutters is also injurious.

Dense smoke from the burning leaves is also found to be a nuisance, and while the smoke from the fire constitutes a menace to automobilists.

Burning leaves on unpaved streets, where there are no curbs and gutters is a nuisance, but it is the pavements about which the department is principally concerned.

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
