London Had Curious Connection With American Civil War.

A curious connection of London with the American civil war was set forth by Public Librarian Fred Landon in a paper read before the London and Middlesex Historical Society last evening. Within the last few years certain documents have become available dealing with the gigantic plot in the summer of 1864 to separate all the northwestern group of states from the north and set up a separate confederacy. The leaders of the south were eager to see this carried out, knowing that it would weaken the north and strengthen their cause, and so from Canada, where they had residential agents, they formed connections with a large semi-political organization known as the Sons of Liberty, having about 300,000 members in the states north of the Ohio, where widespread disaffection with the Historical Society last evening where widespread disaffection with the administration at Washington pre-
