The deliveries of all kinds of farm produce for table use were on a generous scale yesterday, but buyers were few. In consequence somewhat easier prices for close buyers are to be looked for to-day. Dealers declined to quote lower prices, but the plentiful supply of poultry, vegetables and butter indicated an abundant stock in the hands of the farmers or in cold storage. Strictly new laid eggs were readily obtainable. Forty cents was the usual figure asked, but 35c was accepted by some dealers.

The butchers complained of a scarcity of choice lamb, and quoted fancy prices. The drop of three cents a bushel for Ontario wheat has put a damper on the eagencess of local farmers to bring their grain to market, and the only grain reported was 100 bushels of oats at 43c. Wheat—The market opened fractionally lower and sold off to 168% for May. The market became oversold and a sharp rally of 1½ took place. We look upon to-day's rally as perfectly natural after the sharp break of the past ten days, but can see nothing permanently bullish in the immediate situation.

Corn—After an easy opening the offer-Corn—After an easy opening, the offerings were by no means as heavy as of late, commission houses were fairly good buyers and the strength in wheat started local shorts covering, resulting in an advance of le per bushel.
