GO HAND IN HAND
Peaceful Citizens Made Vic-
tims of Vicious Circle,
Says Irish Archbishop.
Belfast, Feb. 22.—In his pastoral
letter read today in all Catholic
churches in the archdiocese of Cashel,
Archbishop Hartley says:
"We are living under a government,
which has proved itself an abject
failure. Neither based on the cov-
enant of the nation, nor working for
the good of the community as a whole,
it has trampled on the will of the
people and upheld the ascendancy of
the pampered minority. History tells
us that where such a system reigns
the laws of God are set aside, coercion
and crime go hand in hand and peace-
ful citizens are made the victims of
the vicious circle.
"The remedy for the Irish upheaval
is obvious, since freedom is the best
solvent of political disorder. The tra-
ditional loyalty of the Irish people to
the laws of God will prevail in the
full when the days of oppression have
passed away forever and when our
people have in their own hands the
making of and the administration of
their own laws.
"The murder campaign is denounced
in a pastoral by Bishop Foley, of
Carlow, who says:
"It is nothing short of appalling to
think that a group of Irishmen, who
in all probability profess the Catholic
faith, should suffer themselves to be
drawn or driven into a conspiracy for
the purpose of taking human life
without a particle of justification from
any source, human or divine."
