WORKS AT 132 YEARS

This Constantinian Saddlemaker's Father Died at 142.

Constantinople, May 14.—In these days

when a man is considered "too old at 60," it is refreshing to learn that there is at Constantinople a veteran called Hadji Raouf, who is still young enough to earn his living as a saddlemaker in his 132nd year, and who has ten more years to go before he can tie his father's record of life.

Even such extreme age as this would not be thought much of in Peru, where Tschudi discovered the baptismal record 142 years before of an Indian father and his son, who was still alive, and where the church registers at Barranca revealed eleven burials in seven years, giving an average of 109 years to each individual.

When Humboldt was at Lima he saw the funeral of an Indian, one Hilario Puri, who was born 143 years earlier, and whose wife died at 117, after 90 years of wedlock. Only a few years ago, too, there was living in New Jersey, Noah Babby, son of an Indian father and a white mother, who had enjoyed his pipe for 130 years, and was still able to enjoy it at 128, and at the same time Valencia's oldest inhabitant was a mason, "still hale and hearty," who had passed his 130th birthday.

THOMAS DAWES DEAD.

Montreal, Que., May 14.—The death is announced at Lachine, of Thomas A. Dawes, head of the firm of Dawes & Co., brewers, at the age of 79. He had been suffering for some time from heart failure. He was unmarried and of quiet temperament, and took little part in affairs outside of his business, his chief interest being in horticulture.

The funeral was held this morning from the family residence, 561 Princess Avenue, to St. Peter's Cathedral, where Father O'Neil conducted the services. Interment was made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

CAPITAL HEARS

LEADER MACKAY

Addresses Large Audience at the

Russell Theater, Supported By

Dominion Ministers.

Ottawa, May 14.—Hon. A. G. Mac-

Kay made his debut at the federal

capital tonight before a large and en-

tirely harmonious audience in the

Russell Theater. Sir Wilfrid Laurier

was unable to be present owing to the

necessity of staying at his post in the

Commons, but the moral support of

the federal Liberals was evidenced in

the presence and speeches of Hon.

George P. Graham and Hon. Rodolphe

Lemieux, and in the backing of a

large number of Liberal members of

Parliament, who were seated on the

platform. Hon. Mr. Graham, who

earlier in the day had tendered a

luncheon to Mr. Mackay and the Ot-

tawa candidates bespoke for his suc-

cessor in the provincial arena the

support of every man who believed in

the principles advocated by the Lib-

eral party, which were the same in

either arena, and which Mr. Mackay

had so well maintained. Hon. Mr.

Lemieux appealed to the French-Can-

adian electors to stand by the suc-

cessor in the provincial arena the

eral premier, who had always cham-

pioned the rights of the minority and

the best traditions of British liberty

and fair play. Mr. Mackay, in an

aggressive and cogent address, dealt

with a few of the issues of the cam-

paign, noting particularly the unfair

way in which Ottawa had been treat-

ed as compared with Toronto, in the

recent gerrymander, and the un-Brit-

ish way in which the Government had

by special act of the Legislature de-

prived the Florence Mining Company

of any rights which they might have

had in the courts, thereby overruling

every principle of fair play and dis-

couraging the investment of foreign

capital in New Ontario. Other speak-

ers of the evening were Hon. N. A.

Belcourt and the two candidates,

Messrs. May and McDougall.
