St. Catharines, Dec. 18.—(Special.)—Navigation on the new Welland Canal closed last hight and preparations will be commenced immediately for the improvements which are to be made. A quarter of a million of dellars is to be spent on the canal this winter. Several bridges are to be re-built which will widen the channel.
