The application of W. Harney for a license in the Vendome hotel was strongly opposed on account of the proximity of the premises to the Seaman's Institute, and Mr. Bartley's application for Rideau Hall opposed on account of its proximity to the High school and the Y. M. C. A.

Both applications were refused. The commissioners at their meeting yesterday heard Mrs. Osborne of Westmorland road, who holds a beer license. Mrs. Osborne was summoned to show cause why her license should not be cancelled. She was recently convicted and fined in the police court on a charge of keeping liquor on her premises. She stated to the commissioners that at the time the offence was supposed to be committed she was not on the premises and whatever happened while she was out she was not responsible for.

The commissioners reserved their decision. In reference to the reduced number of liquor licenses and the possibility of further reductions it is pointed out that there is a movement on foot to hold another local option vote on the license question in Sydney and Stanley wards. If the vote carries there will be a further reduction of nine possible licenses, six of which are now held.

As a result of the license commissioners granting a liquor license to M. J. Nugent, of 422 Douglas avenue, the provincial government is petitioned to remove the license commissioners from office on the ground that they are morally unfit. This was intimated to the Telegraph last evening by Rev. D. Hutchinson, of Main street Baptist church.

When informed that the commissioners had decided to grant the license, Mr. Hutchinson said: "In granting a license for the premises occupied by M. J. Nugent the commissioners have taken a tremendous responsibility on themselves. They have gone contrary to the feelings and opinions of all the good moral citizens of this section of the city. Everyone admits the location of the saloon is bad and even more addicted to drink refused to sign a petition in favor of the license, feeling that it was located in the wrong place. 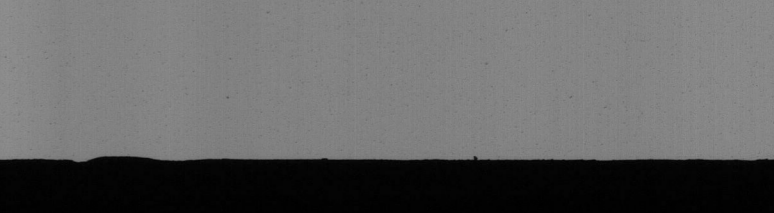
