Last evening R. C. Elkin, received a cable from Capt. Williams saying that they had arrived safely after a very boisterous passage. She lost a part of her deckboard and some of her sails but the crew are safe.

The message was a great relief to the agent, R. C. Elkin, and also to the members of Capt. Williams' family here, as they had about given up all hope of ever hearing from the vessel.

The cablegram did not give much information, but details will be forthcoming in a letter.

The Lewanika was loaded with pitch pine. She was 288 tons net.

Capt. Williams home is in the North End.
