

BYE-LAWS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

A Law to establish a Fire Department, and to provide for the better extinguishing of Fires in the City of Saint John.

Passed 4th February, 1851.
Confirmed 20th May, 1851.

[CONCLUDED.]

XXII. *And be it Ordained*, That if any Engineer of any Engine Company shall wilfully neglect or refuse to perform his duty in any respect, or shall be guilty of disorderly conduct, or of disobedience to the order of the Chief Engineer, he shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Forty Shillings, and on conviction of a second offence, in addition to such forfeiture and penalty, shall be *ipso facto* discharged from the Fire Department; and if any Fireman shall wilfully neglect or refuse to perform his duty, or shall be guilty of disorderly conduct, or of disobedience to the order of the Chief Engineer, or any of the Officers of his Company, he shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings, and on conviction of a second offence, in addition to such forfeiture and penalty, shall be *ipso facto* discharged from the Fire Department.

XXIII. *And be it Ordained*, That any Member of an Engine Company, or of the Company of Hook and Ladder-men, may, for any offence under this Ordinance, be temporarily suspended from the said Department by the order of the Engineer of his Company, sanctioned by the Mayor, or any one of the Aldermen or Councillors of the said City, which suspension and the cause thereof, shall, by the parties so suspending the said Member, be reported in writing to the Common Clerk of the said City, to be submitted at the next meeting of the Common Council.

XXIV. *And be it Ordained*, That it shall be the duty of the several Firewards within the City, immediately on the alarm of fire, to repair to the place where it may be, and to advise with, and assist the Chief Engineer and the other Engineers in endeavouring to extinguish the said fire; also, to exert themselves in procuring supplies of water for the respective Fire Engines, by compelling persons to form lines for the passing of water, or otherwise, as may be found necessary. It shall also be their duty to prevent the persons so forming the lines, and all Members of the Fire Department, from being interfered with in the discharge of their duty, and to keep idle and disorderly persons at a proper distance from the fire, and the vicinity thereof; also, to give directions as to the removal and protection of the property which it may be necessary to have removed; and that all persons present, not being Members of the said Fire Department, are hereby enjoined to obey the directions of the Chief or any other Engineer, or any Fireward, under the penalty of Fifty Shillings; and it shall be the duty of the Chief and other Engineers, and of the Firewards, to report to the Mayor of the City the name of every person liable to the penalty provided in this Section.

XXV. *And be it Ordained*, That if any person shall wantonly or maliciously spoil, break, injure, damage, or render useless any Engine, or any of the apparatus belonging thereto, or used for the purposes of the Fire Department, he shall forfeit and pay, for every such offence, the sum of Ten Pounds.

XXVI. *And be it Ordained*, That no person shall have, put, or keep any hay or straw uncovered in any sack or pile, or in any other way exposed within one hundred and fifty feet of any building within the said City, or shall have, put, or keep any hay or straw, except in stacks, bays, or other close and sufficient covering, in any dwelling house or other building wherein fire is kept in the said City, under the penalty, for each and every offence, of Forty Shillings; and the further penalty of Ten Shillings for every twenty-four hours the same shall so remain after conviction thereof, or after notice in writing given by any two of the Firewards of the said City to remove or secure the same.

XXVII. *And be it Ordained*, That if any person shall refuse or neglect to obey any order, direction, or notice given by any two or more of the Firewards, by virtue and in pursuance of this Law, he or she shall forfeit, for each and every such offence, the sum of Three Pounds; and a further sum of Twenty Shillings for every twenty-four hours he or she shall continue to neglect or refuse obeying such order, direction, or notice.

XXVIII. *And be it Ordained*, That every dwelling house within this City, having two or more fire-places, or one fire-place and one stove in different rooms, and also every store or warehouse, distinct from the dwelling-house, where fire is usually kept, whether in a stove or a fire-place, and every dwelling-house, store, or warehouse of the like description, hereafter to be erected, within six months after the same shall be occupied, shall be provided with two good leather buckets, each of which shall be sufficient to contain two gallons and a half of water, and shall be well painted inside and out, and be marked on the outside with the first letter of the Christian name and the Surname at length, of the Proprietor of such house, store, or warehouse, and shall be kept hanging in some conspicuous part of the same, ready to be used for extinguishing fires when there shall be occasion, and shall not be used for any other purpose, and that such buckets shall be found and provided by the person inhabiting or occupying such houses, stores, or warehouses respectively, or where there are several tenants, by the person occupying the lower or ground floor thereof, at the expense of the owner, and if such inhabitant or occupant be a tenant, the price thereof shall be allowed and deducted out of the rent, and if any housekeeper or other person as aforesaid, shall neglect to provide and have in their respective dwelling-houses, or other buildings before mentioned, the leather buckets hereinbefore directed, every such housekeeper or person shall, for every month he shall so neglect, forfeit the sum of Ten Shillings.

XXIX. *And be it Ordained*, That no gunpowder shall be kept in any house, out-house, store, warehouse, cellar, barn, building, or place whatsoever within the limits of this City, in any quantity exceeding twenty-five pounds at any one time, such quantity not exceeding twenty-five pounds, hereby allowed to be kept, to be always kept secure in tin or copper canisters, under the pain of the forfeiture of such gunpowder, and the further penalty of Ten Pounds for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner of such gunpowder, or the person in whose possession or custody the same may be found, either in a larger quantity than twenty-five pounds, as aforesaid, or insecurely kept, contrary to the true intent and meaning hereof.

XL. *And be it Ordained*, That if any Ship or Vessel arriving and coming into the Harbour of the said City, (Queen's ships excepted,) shall have any gunpowder on board, exceeding the said quantity of twenty-five pounds, such gunpowder exceeding that quantity shall be unladen and discharged from such ship or vessel within forty-eight hours after her arrival, and before such ship or vessel shall be brought alongside of any pier or wharf in the said City, under the pain of the forfeiture of such gunpowder, and

under the penalty of Ten Pounds for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner or owners of such ship or vessel, or the master or person having charge or command thereof, and that whenever any gunpowder is discharged from any ship or vessel in the said Harbour, the same shall be conveyed by water, in a boat or boats, to some safe and secure place for the deposit of gunpowder, without the limits of the said City, during which conveyance such gunpowder shall be covered with a tarpaulin, or other secure covering, under the penalty of Five Pounds for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner or owners of such gunpowder, or the person having the charge and direction of such conveyance.

XLI. *And be it Ordained*, That no gunpowder shall be taken or received on board of any ship or vessel bound to sea, (Queen's ships excepted,) while such ship or vessel shall be and remain at any Pier or Wharf in the said City, nor until such ship or vessel shall be cleared out at the Custom House and ready for sea, under the pain of the forfeiture of such gunpowder, and under the further penalty of Ten Pounds for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner or owners of any ship or vessel into which such gunpowder may be so received, contrary to the true intent and meaning hereof, or by the person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel; and that when it is intended to take or lade any gunpowder on board of any ship or vessel lying in the said Harbour, the same shall be conveyed by water to such ship or vessel, during all which conveyance such gunpowder shall be covered in the manner hereinbefore mentioned, under the penalty of Five Pounds for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner or owners of such gunpowder, or the person having the charge or direction of such conveyance. Provided always, that gunpowder in any quantity not exceeding one cask, may be carried by hand through the streets of the said City, to be used or kept by any person or persons, in the manner permitted by this Law, if such gunpowder shall be so carried in a thick canvass or leather bag, or other secure covering.

XLII. *And be it Ordained*, That all gunpowder forfeited under and by virtue of this Law, shall and may be seized by any one of the Aldermen, or any one of the Firewards in the said City, and when seized, shall be given in charge of one of the Marshals of the said City, to be deposited in some safe and secure place, without the limits of the said City, and upon conviction thereof, any such Marshal shall and may, and he is hereby authorized and empowered, within three days after such conviction, to sell such gunpowder at Public Auction, by sample, in the Market Square in the said City, giving two days notice of such sale, by advertising the same at the East end of the Public Market House in the said Market Square, and the proceeds of such sale, after deducting the necessary costs and charges of presentation and sale, shall be paid by the said Marshal to the Chamberlain of the said City, for the use of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty.

XLIII. *And be it Ordained*, That every Engineer (excepting the Chief Engineer) and every Fireman, so long as he shall continue in office, in addition to the privileges and exemptions allowed by Law, shall also be freed, exempted, and discharged from the payment of any Assessment made upon him for Lamp, Watch and Scavenger, and Fire Department services in the said City; provided, that such exemption shall not, in any individual case, exceed Five Pounds.

XLIV. *And be it Ordained*, That a Law of this Corporation, entitled "A Law for preventing and extinguishing Fires within the City of Saint John," be, and the same is hereby repealed.

XLV. *And be it Ordained*, That all fines, penalties and forfeitures imposed in and by this Law, shall and may be prosecuted and recovered by and in the name of the Chamberlain of the said City for the time being, upon conviction of the offender, before the Mayor, or Recorder, or one of the Aldermen of the said City, witness or witnesses, the confession of the party offending, or the view of the said Mayor, Recorder, or Alderman before whom such conviction shall be had, or by action of debt in any Court of competent jurisdiction to be prosecuted, or in any other lawful method to be obtained, in the manner and for the uses directed in and by the Charter of the said City, and shall and may be levied by distress and sale of the offender's goods and chattels, by Warrant under the Hand and Seal of the said Mayor, or Recorder, or Alderman as aforesaid; and in case sufficient goods and chattels cannot be found whereon to levy, the said offender shall be committed to the Common Gaol of the City and County of Saint John, there to be imprisoned for Two days, when the fine or sum to be paid shall be Five Shillings; or Four days, when the fine or sum shall be Ten Shillings; or Ten days, when the fine or sum shall be Twenty Shillings; or Fifteen days, when the fine or sum shall be Forty Shillings; or Twenty days, when the fine or sum shall be Fifty Shillings; or Twenty-five days, when the fine or sum shall be Three Pounds; or Thirty days, when the fine or sum shall be Five Pounds; or Forty days, when the fine or sum shall be Ten Pounds.

XLVI. *And be it Ordained*, That no person, without permission in writing from the Mayor, shall kindle any fire, nor furnish the materials for any fire, nor in any way authorize or allow any fire to be made in any street, road, square, lane, or alley, or upon any wharf or pier in this City, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.

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XLVIII. *And be it Ordained*, That no person shall have, put, or keep any hay or straw uncovered in any sack or pile, or in any other way exposed within one hundred and fifty feet of any building within the said City, or shall have, put, or keep any hay or straw, except in stacks, bays, or other close and sufficient covering, in any dwelling house or other building wherein fire is kept in the said City, under the penalty, for each and every offence, of Forty Shillings; and the further penalty of Ten Shillings for every twenty-four hours the same shall so remain after conviction thereof, or after notice in writing given by any two of the Firewards of the said City to remove or secure the same.

XLIX. *And be it Ordained*, That if any person shall refuse or neglect to obey any order, direction, or notice given by any two or more of the Firewards, by virtue and in pursuance of this Law, he or she shall forfeit, for each and every such offence, the sum of Three Pounds; and a further sum of Twenty Shillings for every twenty-four hours he or she shall continue to neglect or refuse obeying such order, direction, or notice.
