## LONG LOW BLACK SHAPES OFF MAINE COAST BELIEVED TO BE GERMAN SUBMARINES?

(New York Herald, July 18).  
The suspected presence of German submarines off the Maine coast in the vicinity of Penobscot Bay, was reported to the state and navy department today by a prominent resident of the summer colony at Castine, a neighbor and friend of Professor W. H. Taft. The name of the informant is withheld on request.  
"Long, low, black shapes," that glide by in the night have been observed on three separate occasions. These ships have been hailed from shore, but failed to respond to the call.  
After the passing of the ships on the following morning large islands of oil were observed in the bay. This is very unusual in Penobscot Bay and could not be accounted for, say the government's informants, by the presence of any ships in the bay.

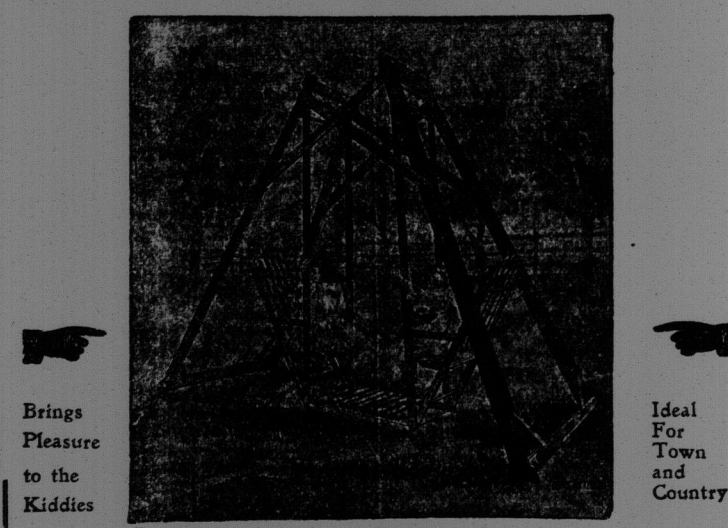
## CHATHAM PULP MILL BURNED

It is a strong play and loses none of its strength or interest because of the fact that it preaches a sermon more eloquent than many which have words as their medium. Productions on such a standard give a new idea of the possibilities of the motion picture as an educational and social force.

## THE TROUBLE AT KRUPP'S

Geneva, Switzerland, July 19, via Paris, 2.20 p.m.—An important meeting was held at Essen yesterday, according to advices received at Basel, between the administration of the Krupp gun works and the representatives of the workmen in order to settle the dispute which has arisen over the demands of the men for an increase in wages.

Directly and indirectly about 100,000 men are involved. Minor cases in which machinery has been destroyed have been reported.  
The military authorities before the meeting, the Basel advices say, warned both sides that unless an immediate arrangement was reached drastic measures would be employed.

The Krupp officials are understood to have granted a portion of the demand of the employees which has brought about a temporary peace, but the workmen still appear to be unsatisfied and many have left the works. A strike would greatly affect the supply of munitions and for this reason the military has adopted rigorous precautions.
