



President Coolidge Disapproves of New Construction by United States

NEW YORK, Dec. 20—That part of the President's Annual Message in which is implied a disapproval of new ship construction by the United States was disappointing to shipping men. There is a growing movement to obtain the authorization of Congress, through the United States Shipping Board, for service in the North Atlantic, running with the Leviathan.

Original plans called for two 30,000-ton ships of 20 knots speed. Recently the plan has become even more ambitious, shipping men contending that the ships should be of 45,000 tons and 22 knots speed at least. With the Leviathan's almost 60,000-tons gross.
