

BALDWIN TAKES STEPS TO AVERT BIG DISASTER

Only Five Days Remain Until Mine Subsidy Ceases

ELECTION HINTED

Premier Threatens To Take Pits Out of Hands of Owners and Miners

LONDON, April 26.—A sudden realization that a stoppage of production of coal may involve Britain in the biggest industrial strike ever known in history, and may even include the closing down of newspapers owing to the printers being drawn into the struggle, is forcing Premier Baldwin, the mine owners and the leaders of the Trades Union movement to try every means under their control to avert such a disaster.

Only five days remain before the subsidy comes to an end and the great efforts are being made on all sides to stave off what is admitted will be a gigantic disaster to British trade.

GENERAL VOTE POSSIBLE

It is recalled in political circles that if the coal strike is supported by the other unions it would create a political situation which might bring about a general election. This result Lord Birkhead has already hinted at.

Premier Baldwin is credited with the intention of taking the mine out of the hands of both the owners and the miners if he cannot secure a settlement this week and this would mean radical legislation so that he might feel it necessary to take the country's decision on the issue of such a settlement before attempting to pass such a law.

OPPOSITION LIKELY

Should the Prime Minister decide to inaugurate such a drastic policy, he would meet with considerable opposition within his own party but it is said he is fully prepared to face this if he believes it is the only solution of the problem. Naturally under all these circumstances the drive for peace in industry at all hazards is gaining momentum and the necessity for averting disaster by some means or other is causing a stimulation, to the feeling of optimism for which there appears to be little foundation save in the hope that it is a much desired consummation.

BRITISH ROYALTY TO ATTEND THEATRE

PROTECTION ON BRITISH RUBBER IS INCREASED

New Restriction Aims To Keep Price At 21 Pence

OLD MARK WAS 15D

Maximum Export Limit of 500 Pounds An Acre Is Abolished

LONDON, April 26.—The element of uncertainty which has existed in the outlook for the crude rubber market and rubber shares has been removed. The colonial office announces that a new method of output restriction will go into effect in August if rubber meanwhile falls below 21 pence (42 cents) a pound, whereas the original restriction scheme aimed at keeping the price over 15 pence.

The announcement says it has been decided that the percentage of standard production of rubber which may be exported at minimum rate of duty from Ceylon and Malaya during the three months beginning August 1, shall be 100, and that the maximum limit of 500 pounds an acre, provided under the regulations applicable to the assessment of estates of more than 25 acres in Malaya, shall be abolished.

MAXIMUM RAISED.

The maximum limit for the assessment of standard production in the case of small holdings, will be raised to 800 pounds an acre for mature rubber and 200 pounds for rubber in bearing but not mature.

At the same time provision will be made for restriction of exports to 80 per cent. of the standard production for the three months beginning August 1, should the average price of spot rubber on the London market fall below one pound during the three months beginning May 1.
