ONE TO PRISON FOR BOND THEFT IN WALL STREET

Clerk Who Turned State's Evidence Sentenced

Ex-Prisoner Under Examination in New York and Valuable Information Reported Given—Montreal End of Some Operations.

New York, May 15—Turning state's evidence against men wanted in connection with New York's \$200,000 bond theft plot, failed to win clemency for Donald C. Bergess, a clerk who yesterday was sentenced from one to two years in state prison, after confessing to the theft of \$200,000 of bonds from a Wall Street brokerage firm.

the bond theft case did not take seriously a report that Arnstein was in the vicinity and would surrender by Monday and give bail. The operations of Arnstein and his gang in Montreal in connection with bond thefts were between February 1 and April 1, according to information received here by local detective agencies. Several checks were cashed in Montreal, only one of which was found to be valid. Principal sufferers were the Ritz Carlton Hotel and the Windsor, while Mappin & Webb, jewelers, had narrow escapes. In January last a man registered at the Ritz as A. D. Johnson of New York. He cashed a check there signed J. W. Fitzmaurice, who was implicated in the bond thefts at New York yesterday. This check appeared to be all right, but later he tried to cash a check for \$800, which did not go through. At the same time he tried to pass a check for \$8,600 on Mappin & Webb. In this he failed. The check was then put into the hands of Am Burns, International Detective Agency and it is said to have been learned that Johnson had swindled the Windsor Hotel for \$288. A warrant is now out for his arrest. It was also said that Johnson had tried the same tricks with the King Edward Hotel in Toronto.

MARINE NOTES.

The R. M. S. P. Cranquet is expected to sail this evening for Bermuda and the British West Indies via Halifax with passengers and general cargo.

The gas schooner Sewanahaka sailed yesterday for Lubec (Me.), with 15,000 gasperaux, caught on a fishing cruise in the Bay.

Three more steamers will arrive here during their next week with raw sugar for the Atlantic Sugar Refinery, the Canadian Warrior from Jamaica, the Sheba from Havana and the J. A. McKee from Guayabel. These are all vessels of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine which has a contract with the refinery for a limited period.

The C. P. O. S. Montclair will have completed loading her general cargo on Monday and will sail for Liverpool and Avonmouth on either Monday or Tuesday.

an attack of heart trouble, but that he would be all right to appear that evening. At 6.50 I arrived at the theatre in a coach, so that he could hardly walk. I assisted him to the dressing room and told him that he was too ill to work, and that I would call the show off. He begged me not to do so, and again insisted that I consented to open and held the curtain fifteen minutes. He went on and within a few minutes after the curtain went up he was forced to leave the stage and collapsed behind the scenes and was carried to the dressing room in a semi-conscious condition. Naturally the curtain was rung down and I again told him I would call off the performance and give those present their tickets back. He again begged me not to do so, assuring me he would be all right, and after a few minutes delay he resumed his part in the performance. Dr. Macaulay that evening spent several hours in close attendance on him and at midnight I phoned him that he thought he would do so but he insisted rather than disappoint him. He added that "it was one of the greatest exhibitions of gameness he had ever seen." Now, under ordinary conditions the first night of a new company in a strange town and a strange theatre is a trying enough ordeal and one that the actor does not look forward to with pleasure, but under the extraordinary condition that obtained during Monday night the performance was given under a terrible strain to the members of the company, especially the ladies, and the effect did not disappear until Thursday. Now that Mr. Perrin has been declared O. K. by Dr. Macaulay, who says that the trouble was caused by over work, which latter I can testify to, the company have resumed their enthusiasm, and unless a similar occasion happens, and I trust it never will, I will have no further apology to offer to our patrons. Actors like all other human beings are subject to the illnesses, trials and tribulations that mankind is heir to. Monday night's audience should be put by applauding Mr. Perrin on his resuming his part.

MORE TROUBLE FOR GERMANY?

New Insurrection With Wholesale Murders Planned, Berlin Despatch Says.

London, May 15—German communists are planning a new insurrection, which may be attended by wholesale murders, according to a Berlin despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co., quoting a statement by Herr Von Graefe, Conservative member of the Reichstag.

It says Herr Von Graefe has advised the minister of defence that meetings of communists are being held regularly in Mecklenburg, and that the question whether land owners should be put to death or whether their wives and children should meet a like fate is being discussed.

He maintains, it is said, that "there is no doubt Mecklenburg would be the scene of frightful slaughter."

PYTHIANS TO FREDERICTON.

A pilgrimage of local Pythians to Fredericton is being planned for next Tuesday, when a composite team from the four St. John lodges will confer the third rank, exemplifying the winning of the golden spur, on a large class of candidates of Fredericton Lodge. Not long ago the same rank was exemplified by a party of St. Stephen and Calais Pythians in this city, and the exemplifications are becoming quite frequent among the lodges of the province.
