I assisted him to the dressing room and told him that he was too ill to work, and that I would call the show off. He begged me not to do so, and against my judgment I consented to open and held the curtain fifteen minutes. He went on and within a very few minutes after the curtain went up he was forced to leave the stage and collapsed behind the scenes and was carried to the dressing room in a semiconscious condition. Naturally the curtain was rung down and I again told him I would call off the performance and give those present their tickets back. He again begged me not to do so, assuring me he would be all right, and after a few minutes delay he resumed his part in the performance.
