**PLANTING.**  
The condition the potatoes are in at the time of planting is a very important factor in obtaining a maximum crop. If possible, potatoes should be prevented from sprouting. Usually they are cut into four parts, but this depends largely on the seed potato itself. Experiments go to prove that the most economical kind of set to use is one with about four eyes and a good amount of flesh. The seed pieces should be from fourteen to

eighteen inches apart in the rows. There is only one thing in favor of sets with few eyes, and that is, the fewer eyes the better, for the smaller proportion of unmarketable potatoes there will be.

The best practice is to select good, medium sized potatoes and make four sets out of them, cutting lengthwise and then across. There are several potato cutters on the market, but while some of these are better than others, the most satisfactory way is to cut by hand. Actual experiment has proved that seed planted as soon as it is cut yields, on an average, eight bushels per acre more than when left unplanted for four or five days. It is very important to plant freshly-cut seed. Leaving the sets uncovered in the trenches lessens the yield. This is worth remembering.

## Will Not Accept Cut of \$300

Mr. Pullen's Offer Rejected  
By City Council

E. S. S. Co. Wharf Lease

Terms for Renewal Outlined—  
Mayor Hayes to Represent City  
at Meeting in Victoria, B. C.

In spite of the fact that Commissioner Bullock, at yesterday's meeting of the common council, recommended and moved that the council reconsider its decision in committee the previous day that James H. Pullen take whatever means he deemed fit to collect the amount of his bill for the painting of the sheds on McLeod and Pettigall wharves, but instead arbitrate with Mr. Pullen in the matter, the council adhered to its previous decision in committee.

His Worship Mayor Hayes will this summer represent the city of St. John at the annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities to be held in Victoria (B. C.), according to decision of council yesterday.

The council was in committee before taking up the order sheet in order to hear A. C. Currie, representing the Eastern Steamship Company, in the matter of the company's application for renewal of the lease of the Point wharf. After hearing the representative of the company the council came out of committee and the matter was settled in general routine.

**Increased Wages.**

The report of the committee of the whole was taken up section by section and passed as follows:

1. Your committee recommend that the commissioners of public works be authorized to give, in his discretion to the workmen at the crushers, for the period from May 1 to May 14 inclusive, the increased rates of wages, ordered by the council on the 14 of May.

2. Your committee further recommend that the offer of \$200 from Mrs. Isabella C. Nice for a conveyance in fee simple of lot No. 559 Brooks Ward, be accepted and deed given under the common seal upon the payment of the purchase money.

3. Your committee also recommend that the communication from Leonard C. Harned, asking for certain fishing privileges over the government property at the Ballast wharf, be filed, the city solicitor having reported that the city has not the power to put them for sale during the present year.

4. Your committee recommend that the estimate of the city engineer of \$6,800 for the cost of repairs to the Reed's Point wharf already commenced be approved and the work proceeded with.

**Tenders for Spruce.**

5. Your committee also recommend that the city engineer be authorized to call for tenders for the supply of 20,000 ft. of Bay Shore merchantable spruce for the purpose of building a wharf, and that the tenders be opened on May 22, 1935, at 10 o'clock a.m. in the city hall.

6. Your committee also recommend that the communication from Leonard C. Harned, asking for certain fishing privileges over the government property at the Ballast wharf, be filed, the city solicitor having reported that the city has not the power to put them for sale during the present year.

7. Your committee recommend that the communication from H. C. Groat, general superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, in which he states that the company is obliged to entirely renew the timber galleries and substructure carrying some of the grain elevator system serving No. 1 berth West St. John, and requests the sanction of the city for the work, be recommended that the permission asked for be given in the understanding that the railway notify the city before the work is commenced and enter into an agreement to be prepared by the city solicitor to the effect that the restoration of the wharf where interfered with, will be entirely to the satisfaction of the city engineer or his representative, and that the entire cost will be borne by the company and it will promptly make good at its own expense, the city engineer or his representative to have the power to point out any defects in the work.

8. Your committee recommend that the request of the New Brunswick Power Company to place one new pole on Barker and two new poles on Sommer street be complied with, to be placed to the satisfaction of the road engineer.

9. Your committee would also recommend that the offer made by the New Brunswick Telephone Company, under date of May 10, 1935, to remove their turnouts into No. 1 car shed, Main street, be accepted.

**Piling Purchased.**

10. Your committee further recommend that the offer of Lewis Corey here, to attached to sell the city about 300 pieces of piling at \$7.50, \$8.50 and \$3.00 respectively, be accepted on condition that the piles were not cut prior to the winter season of 1934-35, and that the smaller sized piles be not less than ten inch and twelve inch bottoms and five inch and six inch tops, said piles to be paid for from time to time as delivered.

11. Your committee also recommend that the account of Frank Boyle of \$795 for 100 pieces of piling purchased by the late commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands, be paid and charged to the balancing of the piling under pier No. 5 and No. 6 West St. John.

**Increased Salary.**

12. Your committee also recommend that the salary of the harbor master, Frank Alward be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,500 to take effect from the first day of June next, and that David R. Willet of the chamberlain's office be granted an increase of \$100 in his salary

### Rounding Up Plotters in Ireland

Dublin, May 21.—The government net is still spreading in hope of arresting other persons believed to be connected with the alleged German plot. A number of suspected persons are being searched, some vehicles in the vicinity of the city are being stopped and the occupants are subjected to examination. The press comment on last night's manifesto of protest issued by the Mansion House anti-conscription conference relates all-round reluctance to take a definite stand regarding the alleged German plot. All parties are marking time, awaiting developments.

The Unionist presume that the government's evidence must be very strong, while the Nationalist press shows some skepticism as to the reality of a plot. The Sun Feins have no daily newspaper. Its half dozen little papers, known in Dublin as "The Mosquito Press" appear weekly on Thursday but at the Sinn Fein headquarters were emphatic denials of the existence of any German plot today. The Unionist organ, the Irish Times, commenting on the Mansion House manifesto, condemns "The scandalous suggestion that a great Irish soldier and an English minister have conspired to blacken Ireland's character in friendly countries."

It describes the manifesto as "in effect a vote of confidence in the Sinn Fein, an appeal to the worst prejudice of the most intolerant Irishman and the reputation of Ireland's duty in the war. If this is the best that Nationalist stonemasonry can do in Ireland's gravest hour, if this is its true message to people who are now in death grips with Germany, decent Irishmen of all parties must hang their heads for shame."
