George Bourne Wins Praise From English Critics For Latest Work


LITERARY GOSSIP

Rider Haggard Changes Eclipse of Sun in King Solomon's Mines to One of Moon - Wonderfu Travel Stories of Man Never Abroad

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, April 29-Once more the cri es are unanimous in praising a new book by a writer whose personality turns out to be uncommonly interesting. The writer is George Bourne, and the book is another of its author's remarkable studies of peasant life in this country, and bears the title, "Change in the Village." Bourne, who has now been writing fo ten years or more, first came into notice with some striking little sketches of humble life in the rural districts, which appeared in the famous "Cornhill Magazine, and a few years ago made something of sensation with a work called "The Better worth Book," which was almost as careful a biography as Boswell's of a typics specimen of the fast-disappearing type English peasant—a garrulous, but observant old fellow, who happened to be Bourne's gardener.
