New York, Jan. 12.—Radio today brought the story of an act of merey performed on the high seas when the Lloyd Sabaudo liner, Conte Rosso, ran 150 miles off her course to pick up a seaman on a freighter whose life could be saved only by an immediate operation.

The Conte Rosso left Naples for New York on Jan. 4. A radio message was received from the U. S. shipping board steamship Eastern King stating that a member of the crew was seriously ill, and that an operation was imperative within twelve hours.
