

STOCK PRICES IN MONTREAL HOLDING FIRM

Opening Advances Predominate But All Alterations Are Fractional

UPWARD TREND IN WALL ST. CONTINUES

Speculative Interest Is Centered Chiefly in Motor Shares

Canadian Press. MONTREAL, May 28.—There were no price changes of importance at the opening of today's stock market, although fractional advances predominated. B. C. Fish and Canada Cement received most attention, the former rising 1/8 to 98, and the latter selling unchanged at 105. Next in activity came Quebec Power and Canadian Industrial Alcohol, the same at 98, and off 1/2 at 10 respectively. Canada Steamships preferred also received attention but the price remained steady at 45. Other leaders to change hands within the first fifteen minutes were Dominion Canners, up 1/4 to 100; Ottawa Power unchanged at 99; Dominion Bridge, unchanged at 92; Bell Telephone unchanged at 138, and Brompton off 1/4 at 25 1/2. The balance of the list was neglected.

UPWARD AGAIN. NEW YORK, May 28.—The upward movement of stock prices proceeded unchecked at the opening of today's market, with speculative interest centered chiefly in the motor shares. New high records were established by Mack Trucks, and the Maxwell issues, and a good demand was noted for White Motor, Willys Overland, and Pierce Arrow shares. Lacelle Gas with an initial gain of 8 1/2 points, led an advance in the public utilities.

Stormy Meeting of British Fascists Quieted When Musician Performs.

BIRMINGHAM, May 28.—Had it not been for the timely intervention of the Birmingham city organist, who played patriotic airs, the mass meeting organized by the British Fascists in the Birmingham Town Hall recently might have ended in serious scenes of violence.

The meeting had been in progress for about an hour and a half when, after intermittent uproar and commotion, a scuffle took place, in which sticks were brandished and fists freely used. At this point the organist started to play, but his efforts were immediately drowned by the strains of "The Red Flag."

Eventually, however, the organist, by opening the loud organs, gained the upper hand, and the tune of "The Red Flag" died away, and the meeting quieted down.

URGES RATE OF \$15 FOR CATTLE

Dr. J. H. Gisdale Says Reduction Would Extend Canadian Market

Declares Present \$20 Tariff Is Impeding Upbuilding of Industry.

OTTAWA, May 27.—Dr. J. H. Gisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, advocated a \$15 per head rate for cattle shipped from Canada to Great Britain, as compared with the prevailing rate of \$20, before the special parliamentary committee on ocean rates this afternoon. He thought \$15 for a matured steer was a reasonable rate when prevailing prices were considered, and if lighter animals were carried five in a stall the rate might be decreased.

A reduction in the rate would open up a market the value of which is scarcely calculable, the witness said. He compared the \$7 cattle rate of some years ago with the rate prevailing today, and said that the present rate was making it difficult to build up the Canadian cattle industry.

COMPANIES WOULD BENEFIT. Not only would the Canadian cattle shipper benefit from a lower rate, but the shipping companies would be assured of regular cargoes because of the development of the industry. There was practically an unlimited market for Canadian cattle in Great Britain and, at present, space was inadequate.

CHILLED BEEF RATES. Sir Henry Drayton mentioned the rate on chilled beef from the Argentine to Great Britain which, he said, was \$1.00 or \$1.05 a hundred pounds. The rate from Canada was \$1.50 per hundred pounds. The voyage from the Argentine occupied approximately 30 days and that from Canada 14. Dr. Gisdale agreed that there were possibilities in the chilled beef business.

H. J. Symington, K. C., informed the committee before adjournment that he had but three more witnesses to examine, one of whom was Sir William Peterson.

The committee adjourned until 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

CONTRACT LET FOR BATHURST SCHOOL

J. E. and D. P. Connelley to Erect New Building—Trout Fry Placed.

BATHURST, N.B., May 27.—Trout fry to the number of 180,000 were placed in Bass River, six miles from here today, by Alex. Mowatt, Campbell. These young trout were transferred to the hatchery at Fundland.

This is part of the programme to rehabilitate the waters of this section with trout hatcheries here today.

The contract for the new Grammar School was awarded this afternoon by the Board of Trustees to J. E. & D. P. Connelley of Bathurst, the price being \$75,000. The contractors are to take the Meehan house from its present site and a lot of 50 x 100 feet in King street, next to Rene Frenette's lot, for \$3,800 to apply against their contract.

The new building will be 77 x 82 feet with two storeys and basement and will be built of native granite. The work will begin at once. Frechette & Freney, of Moncton, are the architects.

NEW ENGINE FOR U. S. NAVAL PLANES

Tests Develop 80 Horse Power at 1,800 Revolutions a Minute.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—As the first step in producing small airplanes which can be practically employed on ships of the navy has been developed a new design, air-cooled engine.

The new motor in its block tests developed 80 horse power at 1,800 revolutions per minute. It weighs only 208 pounds, or 26 pounds per horse power, in order to obtain a small engine of such light weight it was necessary to introduce a number of novel features of construction.

The engine is a static-radial, having five cylinders. The usual pushrod construction for actuating the valves has been eliminated and in its place has been substituted a hydraulic valve gear utilizing the lubricating oil.
