CHANG AND OFFICERS

Tso Lin Refuses to Promise Mercy For Defeated Chinese

TOKIO, Dec. 26—The foreign office has received advices from the Japanese consul at Mukden that General Tso Lin has refused to promise mercy for the preservation of the lives of the detated Marshal Kuo Sung Ling's family and also for the lives of Kuo's principal officers. Consequently it is feared that a general execution of Chang's enemies it imminent.


