SAVINGS BANK The withdrawals at the Dominion Savings Bank last month were \$78,157.48 and the deposits \$22,152.75.

CUSTOMS FOR MONTH The customs receipts here for November were \$123,091.20, made up of \$122,828.85, duties paid, and \$262.35, marine fees. The total for the corresponding month last year was \$126,644.45.

THE LANDSDOWNE The Canadian government steamer Landsdowne has been removed from the blocks and will be put into service again this week. Her hull and engines were given a thorough overhauling while she was laid up.

HEAVY TRAFFIC The usual advance rush of passenger traffic from the west has begun with the opening of the winter season. The Montreal train came in in two sections today, having quite a large passenger list.

MARITIME PROVINCE FOLKS ABROAD F. R. Taylor of St. John and Mr. and Mrs. J. Curran, of Halifax, were among Canadians registered at the Canadian High Commissioners offices in London recently. Cyril Russell of Halifax was registered at the Canadian offices in Paris.

IN FORMER PULPIT Rev. Neil MacLachlan, B. A., now of Fredericton, occupied his former pulpit in Portland Methodist church yesterday delivering able sermons at both services. Many members of his flock took advantage of the opportunity to wish him success in his new charge in Hamilton, Bermuda, where he will go next year.

ACCIDENT William Mayble of Winslow street, Carleton, was hurt while at work in the Partridge Park Mill on Saturday by a fall of mortar falling a distance of twenty feet and striking him. It was feared he had been fatally injured. Examination by Doctor Neave showed that he had two ribs broken as well as being badly bruised.

NORTH END POCKET PEDDLING CASE IS DISMISSED TODAY

Uncle of Boy Tells of Policeman Bringing Him Home—Testimony of Bottle Drinking on Wharf

The evidence in the case against John Porter charged with "pocket peddling" of liquor at Hillyard's wharf on Sunday Nov. 23, was concluded before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning and the case was dismissed. Leonard Van Home of Hillyard street said that he was with four others on Hillyard's wharf on the Sunday in question and that he had a square face of cents. He passed it round to the crowd three times and he himself had as many as four drinks. They drank the gin diluted from the bottle.

Magistrate Ritchie here remarked that he was getting \$1000 a year, which was a much larger salary than the witness earned but he said that he had not seventy-five cents to spare for a bottle of liquor since 1888.

Van Home said that he knew the district had a bad reputation and he had heard of liquor being peddled on Sunday mornings but knew of none on this particular day, that he did not know of liquor which William Kennedy, a boy, was found on Hillyard's wharf on that day and he had not seen the defendant all on that Sunday.

William Kennedy, Jr., uncle of a boy who had given to Policeman Briggs information upon which Porter was arrested, took the stand and said the boy who lived with him had been brought home by Policeman Briggs about nine o'clock on the evening of last Sunday morning. He was very much under the influence of liquor and talked wildly not knowing what he was saying. The witness had never seen his nephew drunk before. The boy said the next day that he had found the liquor.

The defendant took the stand and said that he was about town on Sunday morning and he was lame about noon and had not left his home until he went to work at seven o'clock on Monday morning. Asked if he knew he had a reputation of peddling liquor in that vicinity, he said he knew it but accounted for it by the fact that he had been arrested and convicted on the charge five years ago, when he paid the penalty. Since then he said he had given up the business. The case was dismissed.

George A. Henderson, police clerk, conducted the prosecution.

Family Received Sympathetic Messages From All Parts of Country—Fredericton Has Real Snow Storm

An impressive service was conducted in the house by Rev. Dr. G. M. Campbell of Sackville, assisted by Rev. Dean Schofield and Rev. Neil MacLachlan. A double quartette sang "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Peace, Perfect Peace." Interment was in the Rural Cemetery. The pall bearers were Senator Thompson, F. B. Carvell, M. P., G. Y. Dibble, Judge Barry, E. Hanson and F. B. Edgcombe. The list of chief mourners included J. A. Brown, of Houlton, P. G. Whippley of Hampton, F. S. Shute, of Yarmouth; C. L. Tracey, R. A. McFadden, S. J. Ethel, Alderman Osborne, A. R. Shipp, H. G. Kitchen and Judge Wilson. Telegrams and letters of sympathy have been received from all parts of the country.

LOOK FOR LARGE SHIPMENTS OF LIVE STOCK THIS SEASON

At one time a large business in this class of live freight was enjoyed from this port, but recently the traffic has slackened considerably and the last few seasons has been light. Those interested are in hopes that the old order of things will be restored.
