

- Q.107. And how are you employed?
- A.107. Druggist.
- Q.108. For what company?
- A.108. MacLeod-Balcom Limited.
- Q.109. Do you recognize the accused?
- A.109. Yes sir.
- Q.110. His name please?
- A.110. Lilley.
- Q.111. Do you remember the evening of the 17th December, 1943?
- A.111. Yes.
- Q.112. Did you see the accused that evening?
- A.112. Yes.
- Q.113. Where, and under what circumstances?
- A.113. In MacLeod and Balcom's drug store. He asked me if I would hold a sum of money for him that he had got from home and he wished to leave for safe keeping.
- Q.114. How much money was it?
- A.114. Forty Dollars.
- Q.115. Do you recall how the forty dollars was made up?
- A.115. Four ten dollar bills.
- Q.116. And what happened to this money?
- A.116. I took it from the accused and put it in a store envelope.
- Q.117. What envelope is that? (Showing witness exhibit "J").
- A.117. That is the store envelope.
- Q.118. Whose handwriting is that?
- A.118. That is mine in lead pencil.
- Q.119. And what is that document? (Showing witness exhibit "I").
- A.119. That is a receipt that I gave Pte. Lilley for the forty follars.
- Q.120. Whose handwriting is on that?
- A.120. That is mine.
- Q.121. Now would you please tell the Court what took place on the 20th December, 1943?
- A.121. Well Lieut. Morris -- is it?
- Q.122. Yes.
- A.122. From the Provost Corps came in and produced that receipt and asked me if I had that sum of money on hand and I said yes.
