M. MeDADE'S VIEW.

M. McDADE'S VIEW. In today's Freeman M. McDade sets forth reasons why there is great dissat-isfaction among New Brunswick liber-als. In summing up he says there are three principal causes, as follows:--"The first is that Mr. Blair, in becom-ing the liberal leader at Ottawa, did not cut clear of his conservative friends with whom he was associated in the provincial field; the second is that Mr. Blair fass enslaved himself in trying to master the details of his railway de-partment instead of leaving that work to his officials, and taking charge of the pairomage question himself; and the third is that the liberals themsel-ves have not taken the grip with the authofflies respecting the matter of patromage." As a remedy Mr. McDade proposes that Hon. Mr. Emmeron be taken into the cabinet to look after the question of New Brunswick patronage, while Mr. Blair gives his time to his own de-partment.
