## THE TURF.

Two World's Records Reduced and Another

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 28.—Two world's records were reduced and another tied at today's meeting of the Memphis Trotting Association. The first special event was the attempt of Direct Hal and Prince Alert to pace a mile, as a team, against the record of 1:58. The pair were driven by the veteran Geers, and when the time, 2:06 1/2, was hung out the crowd gave the stars an ovation.

Onward Silver next appeared to beat his previous two-mile trotting record of 4:22 1/2. Driven by Hudson, the horse made a gallant effort, but he would only tie his former mark.

The bay stallion Nervola was sent against 4:25 1/2, the pacing record for stallions at two miles. A full record was clipped off the old figure.

Prince Alert failed to beat the gelding's pacing record of 2:03 1/2, finishing the mile in 2:01 1/2.

## BANK OF ENGLAND.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Bank of England's rate of discount was unchanged today at 4 per cent.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserves, £218,000; bullion, increased £23,928; other securities, decreased £250,000; other deposits, decreased £270,000; public deposits, decreased £9,000; notes reserve, increased £176,000; government securities, unchanged. The proportion of the Bank of England's reserve to liability is 46.59 per cent. Last week it was 45.71 per cent.

## STOCK MARKET.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Wall street—Supporting orders were in evidence in some stocks at the opening, particularly St. Paul and some of the Pacifics and Coalters. Other stocks, however, were under pressure, including Louisville, A. T. and Santa Fe, Central and U. S. Steel. Fluctuations either way were limited to small fractions and trading was dull.

## TARTE ON SIFTON.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—The Patrie, Mr. Tarte's organ, last night made the Doukhobors the text of a slashing article against Mr. Sifton's immigration policy. The Patrie's article, which is apparently written by Mr. Tarte, says that the British Columbia government was right in refusing admission to the Doukhobors, and it adds:

"We have imported during the last two or three years at great expense, thousands of immigrants who have been more of a source of trouble and peril than of benefit. We have been informed by an authority on immigration matters that in a lot of immigrants who recently arrived there were not five persons perfectly sane. We do not require here the scum of Europe."

Francis Trainor, an employee of Myrick's fish market, Charlottetown, P. E. I., was instantly killed by a live wire in the store on Tuesday afternoon.

Hon. R. B. Dickey has offered the town of Amherst two acres of land on Pleasant street for a hospital site, and a committee has been appointed to obtain plans and general information.

Rev. Donald McGillivray, of Lunenburg, and Miss Mina A. Bishop, of Digby, were married at Digby yesterday.

Matthew A. Allison, formerly of Halifax, and Miss Alicia C. Dysart, formerly of Cambridge, Mass., October 21.

Rev. D. Steele, son of Rev. D. A. Steele, of Amherst, has been appointed postmaster of that town to succeed Amos Purdy, dismissed.

A Frederick despatch says A. R. Estey will cut about 6,000,000 feet of logs this winter.

Reports concerning the erection of a Jewish Synagogue in Halifax have been true for some time. The Jews have secured a lot and the preliminary work of excavating is under way. The synagogue will be complete about New Years, and will cost about \$5,000. The Jewish element in Halifax is large and mercantile interests extensive.

A new company for the development of Acadia Mines has been engaged. The company is capitalized for one million dollars and will give employment to upwards of 500 men. Actual operations began on the 24th inst. for the re-starting of the works—Springhill, Nova Scotia.

It is estimated that more vessel tonnage has entered and cleared at Parrabro this summer, than at any other port in Nova Scotia outside of Halifax.

Samuel Barclay, son of Frederick Barclay, of Milltown, was drowned in Benis lake on Saturday while duck shooting. He was sixteen years of age.

The new rails on the Springhill and Parrabro railway will soon be laid to Parrabro. The work is being pushed ahead as fast as possible, and considering the interruptions from trains, the men are doing good work. The big rails start at a point about six miles from Springhill and are now within five miles of Parrabro. As soon as the rails are laid to Parrabro the new locomotive will begin hauling coal to the Company's wharf.

The weather was very unfavorable, but a fair audience greeted this talented young lady on her first appearance to the town and were amply repaid.

## OVER 200 HEATS

Trotted or Paced in the Provinces This Season in 2:30 or Better.

(Halifax Recorder.)

The trotting and pacing season in the Maritime Provinces has been brought to a close and the Recorder following its annual custom publishes some facts and figures in connection therewith, which gives ample proof of its being one of the most successful years in the history of the turf in the Provinces, and showing the progress that has been made in our harness races. Nearly two score of meetings were held on the various tracks in the Maritime Provinces, and the six days meeting at Halifax was the largest and the greatest speed ever exhibited at a meeting in this country.

It is eleven years ago since Israel, by Rampart, was the first horse bred in the Maritime Provinces to trot in 2:30 over one of our tracks, while this year a 3:00 trotter, Starlight, another son of Rampart, obtained a record of 2:24 1/2, and Honest Dominick, a pacer without a record previous to this season, obtained a record of 2:21 1/2.

The harness record for the provinces was lowered to 2:15 1/2 at Sussex by pacing mare Ituna, by Burbon Wilkes, owned by Mayor J. M. Johnson, Calais, Me.

No less than 202 heats were trotted or paced in 2:30 or better over provincial tracks, while there were 18 heats from 2:15 1/2 to 2:30, a remarkable proof of the great improvement of the speed of our trotters. Seventeen horses owned in the provinces entered the charmed circle, and over a dozen already in the list reduced their records. The list is as follows:—

Honest Dominick, who is owned by J. A. McLean, Sydney, and is by a son of Sunol Prince, started last year, but won his first heat at Sydney last August in 2:31 1/2. He paced to his record of 2:22 1/2 at Halifax exhibition races, the fastest mile ever made on a provincial track by a provincial bred horse, who had started the season without a record.

Starlight, who is the fastest new trotter of the year, and owned by J. A. Johnson, Halifax, obtained a record of 2:24 1/2 in a wagon race at Halifax in 1899, but this year won five out of six slow classes in which he started, and in all straight heats, and every heat from 2:24 1/2 to 2:31 1/2.

Zeta M, owned by S. A. Fowler, St. John, won her first heat this year in the 2:40 class, at Woodstock, in August, and on the same track in September, obtained her record of 2:24 1/2, winning a six heat race in the 2:29 trot and pace.

Sousa, owned in Moncton, was imported from Ontario, and obtained her record at Halifax. Kate Willard, imported by E. LeRoi Willis, from Michigan, and obtained her record at Sussex. Donella, owned by J. B. Gilchrist, Greenwich, N. B., won the 2:30 class at Calais, in July, in 2:26 and at Sussex reduced her record to 2:24 1/2.

George was purchased in Montreal by C. B. Keith, Berry's Mills, N. B.; he has no knowledge of his breeding, he took his record at Memramouc.

Lady Lums, owned by W. D. McKay, St. Stephen, won a heat at Calais July 4, in 2:29 1/2, and at Woodstock made her present record.

Harry M, owned by Charles Urquhart, Elmfield, had a record of 2:45 last year, and made his present record at Halifax at the exhibition meeting.

Nina Wilkes, owned by J. R. Cowan, Springhill, took a record of 2:31 1/2 last year, which this year she further reduced to 2:28 at Halifax, and later to 2:27 at Springhill.

Basil, owned by H. M. Bain, Kentville, took a record of 2:37 at Bridge town last year, and reduced his record at Halifax. Louis M is owned by S. H. Sterling, Fredericton, and got her record at St. John. Tom, owned by F. C. Reddin, North Sydney, obtained his record at Sydney in September, winning the first heat of the 2:30 class.

Sunny Lawn, owned by R. Hober, Moncton, obtained his record at Shediac. Jim Gordon, owned by C. W. Cook, Shediac, took his mark at the same place. Dolly King, owned by Fraser Bros, Sydney, went into the list at Halifax, and Guy Norval also obtained his record at Halifax.

Park Campbell, the fast Provincial bred performer of the year on our tracks, is owned by J. R. Cowan's Springhill. He entered the list last year, and his mile in 2:18 1/2 was the fastest mile over a Nova Scotia track this season.

Gertie Glen, owned by J. A. Tribe, Woodstock, reduced her record at Woodstock and Sunol Prince, owned by S. A. Fowler, St. John, obtained his record at Eastport. Roberval, owned by A. B. Etter, Amherst, got his fastest mark at Charlottetown; R. T. M, owned by C. E. Beckwith, Kentville, won his record at Sussex, as also did Rez, who is owned by J. R. Cowan's Springhill; Guy J., owned by C. E. Willis, Amherst; Alix T, owned by E. LeRoi Willis, Sydney; Bertha L, owned by J. A. Leaman & Co., Halifax; and Cassimira, by A. Lamphier, Halifax, all took their records in Halifax.

Cherry Arden, owned by J. M. Murchie, Milltown, N. B., got her record at St. Stephen; Tutrix, owned by E. H. Barte, St. Stephen, at Woodstock; Golden Gate, owned by H. J. Fleming, St. John, at Sussex, and Duke, owned by M. Ross, North Sydney, at North Sydney.
